## EXHIBITION GAME STARTS AT 2 P.M. SHARP SATURDAY

### Public Luncheon for Barnstorming Beavers at Hotel Medford at 11:45 A. M.—Lineups Are Announced

It's Portland's Beaver versus the Oregon All-Stars tomorrow afternoon at the high school turf field in the greatest baseball show staged here in the past quarter of a century.

Opening pitch of the clash between the club that battered its way to second place in the Pacific Coast league and the finest players of Medford, Ashland and Grants Pass will be at 2 o'clock sharp. There will be a radio at the ball park to keep fans informed of the progress of football games up and down the coast. There will also be a loudspeaker system on hand through which details of the ball game will be announced.

May Arrive Tonight

The Beavers are scheduled to arrive in Medford some time this evening or early tomorrow morning. With the exception of Manager Bill Sweeney, Outfielder Johnny Fredericks and Pitcher Ad Liska, the team which will bring to southern Oregon fans their first taste of Pacific Coast league baseball in 25 years will be the same man for man, that finished fourth in the regular coast league pennant race, blasted the San Francisco Seals for four straight in the Shugness playoffs, and then lost to San Diego for the championship.

A public luncheon at 11:45 a. m. tomorrow at the Hotel Medford will officially welcome the colorful Ducks to the city. Fred Erickson, president of the Medford Athletic association, sponsor of the all-star game, will act as master of ceremonies. He will introduce each Portland player. The luncheon has been arranged by the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce and will be attended by scores of local baseball fans. The public is cordially invited, and A. H. Banwell, manager of the chamber, warns all desiring seats to make reservations immediately at the chamber office, either by telephone or in person.

Possible May Pitch

Although no definite word has been received from Dr. Leonard Meikle, club trainer, who is handling the Beavers, regarding the Coasters' pitching selection, it is believed that Navy Bill Poesdel, winner of 21 league ball games this year, will be on the mound. For the All-Stars, Manager Wally Rickert, stated that either Bill Lanning, right-hander from the Blisbee team in the Arizona-Texas league, or Larry Pepper, brilliant Medford righthander, would start for the bush leaguers. Ray Erickson, another starboard flyer, will be held in reserve.

With the appearance of the Beavers in Medford, Oregon addicts of the national pastime will witness three players who next year will wear the uniforms of major league teams. Poesdel, after his brilliant season in the Coast league, was sold to the Brooklyn Dodgers and will report next spring. Pete Coscarart, great-fielding second sacker, was also sold to the Duffy Dodgers. Nino Bongy, who led for the Pacific Coast league batting championship with a mark of .336, according to the Howe News bureau, was drafted by the Cincinnati Reds, and will next season produce basehits under the big top.

Cleavage Coming

With the exception of first base, Portland's infield is all set with Pete Coscarart on second, Dudley Lee at short, and Frank Bedore at third. With neither Manager Sweeney nor Johnny Fredericks on hand, the initial cushion occupancy will not be known until game time.

In the outfield, the famous Moose Cleavage, slugger de luxe, will be in left, Bongy in center and Mike Tresh, sensational rookie, in right. Cleavage, the powerhouse of the team, batted .322 and finished third in run-batted-in with 113. Bongy, a s t i n g lightning-fast speed afield and a deadly hitting eye, was considered one of the finest outfielders in the league.

Veteran Bill Cronin will undoubtedly do the Beaver catching, although Tresh may see service behind the plate. Other Beavers who will probably be in the party are Montague, utility infielder, and Shewley, Hobo Carson and Bedonita, pitcher.

All-Stars Assigned

For the All-Stars, Ancient Al Drolette of Grants Pass will do the catching. Bob Kemetzer, SONS flash, who played in the Willamette Valley league this season, will be on first, Rickert of Medford will be on second, Dick Lewis of Medford will be on short, and either Frank Donovan of Medford or Arba Ager of Ashland will take care of third base. In the outfield, duties will be split among Paul ("Hoosier") Hofford, Medford, and Dick Sakraids, Medford, Chuck Ostrum, Arnold Machado and Earl Ray, all of Grants Pass.

Those players are among the finest in southern Oregon and, while not figuring to beat the Beavers, are hoped to the skies to give them an interesting afternoon.

Pepper are both excellent pitchers, interestingly graduating from Grants Pass last spring to the class D Arizona-Texas league, where he won 13 and lost 11 games. Pepper is one of the most promising young hurlers ever developed locally.

The largest crowd ever to witness a baseball game in Medford is expected for the appearance of the Beavers. Portable bleachers will be placed on the first and third floor lines to augment the two covered grandstands, which combined seat over 1000. The field is in fine condition.

## OHIOANS FAVORED OVER TROJANS IN SATURDAY CLASH

### Bruins Oppose Indians — California Takes on W. S. C. — Huskies Heavy Favorites to Take O. S. C.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Southern California's Trojans will clash with Ohio State in a big inter-sectional duel at Los Angeles tomorrow while games at Palo Alto, Berkeley and Seattle will shape the Pacific Coast conference football race.

Ohio State's Buckeyes were heavy favorites over the Trojans, who tasted first defeat last Saturday in losing 7 to 0, to Washington. Ohio state swept to recent victories over Texas Christian and Purdue.

The Bruins of University of California at Los Angeles rested last week end following their 26-to-13 thumping of Oregon, will oppose Stanford's Indians, who have yet to win a game. U. C. L. A. was the popular favorite, though Stanford has a new backfield combination and was fired up to break into the victory column.

Bears Face Cougars

At Berkeley, California's powerful Bears, who decisively trounced St. Mary's and Oregon State, will face Washington State college, which played a scoreless tie with Gonzaga and then routed Idaho last week, 13 to 0.

Washington's Huskies, riding the high road toward their second conference championship, were overwhelming favorites over twice-defeated Oregon State.

Struborn Little Gonzaga, which held both Washington State and St. Mary's to scoreless ties, will turn its great fullback, George Karamatic, on Oregon's Webfoot in a game at Spokane. Oregon defeated Stanford, 7 to 6, last Saturday.

Gaels Meet Wolves

St. Mary's Galloping Gaels, slowed to a trot by one defeat and one tie, will try for their first victory in a battle with Nevada's Wolves at San Francisco. The Nevadans, victors over Wyoming, were considered no sort touch.

In other far western engagements, Idaho will face Utah at Salt Lake City; the Oklahoma Aggies and Arizona will meet in a night game at Phoenix; and Willamette will oppose University of Portland in the latter's field.

Hardin-Simmons of Texas will test the Loyola Lions at Los Angeles in a night game tonight. In another flood-lighted contest, the veteran Amos Alonzo Stagg's College of the Pacific Tigers, 1936 champions, will open their far western conference season against Chico State college at Chico.

Medford high's Black Tornado, 35 strong, left for Roseburg in one bus this morning for their clash with the Pirates under the lights tonight. The battle will start at 8 o'clock.

Three regulars of Coach Bill Bowerman's machine will not see action. Warren Bayless, blocking back, received a slight concussion in last week's Hood River encounter, and will remain at home. Fred Stevens, center, is suffering from a bad cold, and will remain on the sidelines, as will Jack Hill, who received a sprained back against the Apple-pickers.

The rearranged Tiger eleven will see Red Root shifted from his end position to blocking back, Miller taking Root's position at the flank, and Prentice bending over the ball. Remainder of the backfield will spread out with Bobby Ettinger in the left halfback post, Jack Bowman at right half, and Eldon Grow at fullback.

Teaming with Miller at the ends will be Don Monteith, Dan Ehrhart and Hubert Santo will be at the tackles, Wally Eri and Gene Archibald at the guards.

Second string backfield will consist of Jones, blocking back, Gillespie, Horner and Campbell at the halfbacks, and Bob Newland, full. 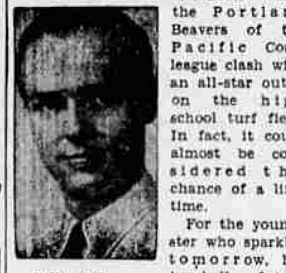
