Harry Perry Twogood, former resident of Talent, died September 24 at Clarkston, Wash., where he was visiting the Rev. and Mrs. J. O. Carriker. He was 64 years old.

Funeral services were held September 27 in Grangeville, Idaho, with the Rev. Hubert E. Sias officiating. Interment was in Prairie View cemetery. Among the large number of mourners at the funeral services were his mother, Mrs. Frances Twogood, and his sister, Mrs. E. E. Pass, both of whom reside in Talent.

Mr. Twogood was born in Grund Meind, Iowa, May 23, 1873. He was a prominent resident of Canfield, Idaho, for 40 years. During that time he became widely known for his sterling qualities and was held in high esteem by all.
