

# Portable Cottages for Isolation of Patients Aid Fight on Tuberculosis in Jackson County

## HEALTH ASSOCIATION TAKES FORWARD STEP IN BATTLING PLAGUE

The first of the three portable cottages for isolation of tubercular patients is now in use in Jackson county as the latest forward step of the county's health officers in the far-flung fight against tuberculosis.

The cottages, designed primarily as part of a program to prevent the spread of disease, will be used by tuberculosis patients awaiting admittance to the state sanitarium.

Jackson county has the distinction of being the first place west of the Mississippi river to adopt this means of combating tuberculosis.

The initial cottage, which is a modification of the Burr cottage, used extensively in the southern states, was placed two weeks ago in the yard near the home of a woman tubercular patient. With the patient occupying the cottage, five others in the home, some of them children, are spared the danger of infection.

One father in Jackson county last year unknowingly infected five of his children. Two are now in the state sanitarium and one is awaiting entrance.

The portable cottages have been adopted by Jackson county to prevent such unfortunate occurrences. The first to be placed in service was designed and the construction supervised by Dr. C. I. Drummond, who recently resigned as county health officer.

### Hospital Overcrowded

Overcrowded conditions at the Oregon tuberculosis hospital inspired his search for a means of temporary isolation of tubercular persons. In 1936 Jackson county had between eight and ten persons awaiting admittance in the sanitarium. Since construction of the new pavilion the situation has improved, but there is still a waiting list.

The first cottage was financed by the Jackson County Public Health association, with Miss Mildred Carlton as president. Proceeds were obtained from the sale of Christmas Seals and through the Community Chest.

This volunteer organization is affiliated with the Oregon Tuberculosis association and has as its major activity the control of tuberculosis.

The manual training department of the Medford high school, L. A. Mentzer, instructor, constructed the building. Cost was estimated at \$200.

The second cottage, recently completed, was financed by the Kiwanis club.

Jackson county health workers, who point with pride to their already low tuberculosis death rate, anticipate an even greater reduction through use of the cottages, pending sanitarium care.

The county's death rate in 1936 was 14.5 persons per 100,000, less than half that of the state of Oregon and one-third that of the United States. In 1928 Jackson county's death rate from the disease was 42 persons per 100,000.

### Method Explained

This great reduction was accomplished through modern methods of case finding and constant supervision and instruction of active cases. The active support of the health agencies by the community, is responsible for the admirable record.

Mrs. Stacie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis association, after viewing the cottage wrote her approval:

"When we consider the long waiting list at our two state tuberculosis hospitals and thus realize the length of time which patients may have to wait for admission, I think Jackson county has taken a very forward step.

"Your patients will be put under hospital regimens weeks and even months before they are admitted to the hospital—it may mean the saving of life, itself. Certainly it is a fine preventive measure."

## SPANISH REBELS BATTLE FOR ROAD

HERNANDEZ, Franco-Spanish frontier, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Spanish insurgents buried their full strength into battle today to blast a path for a final advance on Gijon, the government's last Biscayan stronghold.

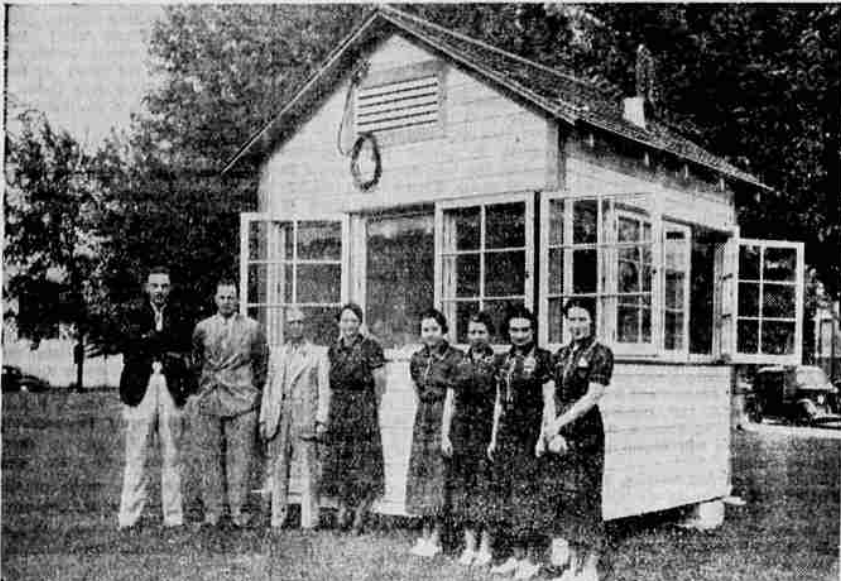
Insurgents fought for Cangas de Onis, strategic town 31 miles southwest of their main objective.

Its capture would free the principal highway to the coast. Beyond Cangas de Onis, Villavieja remained the last town of importance before Gijon itself.

## GOVERNOR FLAYS LABOR DEMAGOG IN KLAMATH TALK

KLAMATH FALLS, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Removal of "racketeers and scoundrels" from the labor movement and deportation of "Cockney" Harry Bridges, Pacific coast C. I. O. head, is the only way to save Oregon from economic disaster and to protect Pacific coast shipping from utter ruin, Gov. Charles H. Martin declared yesterday.

In an informal address before Klamath Potato Growers' association, the governor said he had positive evidence Bridges was a "communist."

"This evidence was uncovered right here in Oregon," he said. "I informed President Roosevelt of it during his recent visit here and urged him to issue a warrant for Bridges' deportation."

"The labor movement today is facing the same thing as prohibition. Racketeers and scoundrels are bringing discredit on it until like prohibition it will arouse so much public opposition that its cause will be lost. The labor situation as it is in Oregon today is no less than criminal nonsense.

"Oregon farming can't stand another Pacific coast shipping strike. Neither can shipping."

## WAR HYSTERIA OF '17 ON WAY BACK

RUTLAND, Vt., Oct. 9.—(AP)—U. S. Senator Gerald Nye (R. N. D.) declared today the United States was rapidly approaching the same "hysteria" over the same causes which 20 years ago carried this nation into the World war.

Speaking at the concluding session of the Vermont Education association the senator said: "We won the war but every cause for which we fought stands demonstrated as a lost cause. We fought a war to end war but we have no guarantee of peace in the future; we fought for freedom of the seas but we have not gained freedom."

Nye declared there was no decency in war and urged that Americans recognize that in present relations in the Sino-Japanese conflict.

## SOVIET MUNITION PURCHASES HUGE

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—(AP)—The Soviet government, engaged in Europe's headlong armaments race, has authorized commercial agents here to purchase \$50,000,000 worth of naval equipment for export to Russia in the immediate future, it was disclosed today.

Morris Wolf, counsel for the Corp Export and Import corporation, of New York, which is negotiating the huge deal, said the war material will consist of pre-fabricated parts of fighting craft—turrets, armor plates, propelling machinery, boilers and engines, and 16-inch naval guns.

The corporation is the special munitions purchasing organization for the Soviet government, he said, and is headed by Samuel Carp, of Bridgeport, Conn., a banker and oil

industrialist. Carp, an American citizen, is a brother-in-law of Premier V. M. Molotov of Russia.

## UNCLE SAM ADDS NEW DESTROYER

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Uncle Sam added another powerful destroyer today to his rapidly growing navy—the \$4,000,000 1,500-ton Fanning.

The destroyer, last of four built by the United shipyards at the Staten Island plant, was commissioned yesterday at the Brooklyn navy yard in a brief ceremony.

The Fanning, second American man-of-war to bear the name, was named for Nathaniel Fanning, who served with John Paul Jones in the Revolutionary war. The vessel carries a crew of 165 men and eight officers.

## MOTHER, 76, TELLS OF MURDER SHOT

ALBUQUERQUE, Oct. 9.—(UP)—The second murder trial in recent months in this little mountain town continued today with Byron Leo Pritch charged with the slaying of Earl C. Smith.

Mrs. Leah Pritch, 76, mother of the accused man, and eyewitness of the killing, was the principal witness she said her son, after being gassed by Smith, jerked a gun from his boot-leg and fired the fatal shot.
