

COMMUNITY CHEST WORKERS RECEIVE LAST INSTRUCTION

Attainment of Goal Is Foreseen by Campaign Head—List Division Chiefs—Daily Reports Scheduled

Firing the opening gun in the campaign to raise \$20,000 for the support of the six agencies participating in the Medford Community Chest throughout the coming 12 months, M. N. Hogan, general chairman of this year's campaign for funds, told a group of 60 volunteer workers at the courthouse auditorium last night that he felt confident the objective would be reached in the three days set for the drive—October 14, 15 and 16.

Mr. Hogan stated that details of the campaign organization have been practically completed and the big task is ahead—the task of securing the practical support of every firm and each employed person in the territory covered by the campaign: Medford, Jacksonville, Central Point, Phoenix and surrounding urban areas.

Mr. Hogan was followed in his remarks by Coyne Briggs, colonel of the chest workers, who explained the campaign organization in detail for the benefit of the majors, captains and workers assembled. He stated that the area to be covered in the campaign has been separated into 13 divisions, with a major responsible for each division, as follows:

Division 1, Coyne Briggs; Division 2, Irving E. Bessley; Division 3, the Rev. E. S. Bartlam; Division 4, Wallace Rickert; Division 5, Adjutant G. R. Durham; Division 6, E. H. Hedrick; Division 7, Larry Schade; Division 8, Leonard Carpenter; Division 9, (to be selected); Division 10, Mrs. H. M. Welshaar; Division 11, Mrs. W. H. Fulmer; Division 12, Mrs. David Rosenber; Division 13, Mrs. O. L. Overmyer, major-at-large, the Rev. Sherman L. Divine.

Mrs. Briggs urged the workers to study the literature which was distributed at the meeting and to be prepared to begin work at 9 o'clock Thursday morning. Workers will report at the old Schuhs Vintage building next to Brophy's, which will be used, through the courtesy of the Medford branch of the United States National bank of Portland, as a report headquarters during the three days of the campaign.

Mr. Briggs said a "report luncheon" will be held each day of the campaign at Valentine's cafe for the purpose of ascertaining just where the progress has been made during the morning's solicitation and for the purpose of fellowship. One of the features of the report luncheons will be community singing, led by Mr. Bessley. Boy scout executive of the Crater Lake area council.

Everyone who has signed up as a worker in any capacity was urged to report at campaign headquarters not later than 9 o'clock Thursday.

Cohan "Wows 'em" With Satirization of New Deal In Musical Comedy Role

BOSTON, Mass., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Staid Boston circles—Republican and Democratic alike—rocked with laughter today over George M. Cohan's tap-dancing satirization of President Roosevelt and the New Deal.

Cohan scored one of the most notable triumphs in his career last night in the world premier of "Id Rather Be Right," George S. Kaufman and Moss Hart's rib-tickling musical-comedy.

The veteran comedian, returning to his first song and dance role in ten years, brought down the house when, portraying a genial tap-dancing President Roosevelt, he crooned:

"If I'm not relected, I'll never fear for hunger, I'll never fear for thirst, I have one son with DuPont, And another one with Hearst."

The satire, reminiscent of the annual Gridiron club shows in Washington at which newspaper men poke good-natured fun at political platforms and leaders, portrayed "Alf Landon" as an obstinate family butler for the Roosevelts who refused to explain to the "president" how he had balanced the Kansas budget. A catchy tune called "Off the Record"—music and lyrics by Richard Rodgers and Lorenz Hart—was the vehicle for many of Cohan's most successful sallies.

The first-night audience chuckled particularly at these verses:

"I sit up in my bedroom, Reading books like Silas Marner—I'd read Sears Roebuck catalogue To get away from Garner."

"My messages to congress Are a lot of booby-booby, I'm not to fond of Bankhead, But I'd like to meet Tallulah."

A major laugh came when the president, at a cabinet session, turned to Attorney General Cummings and ordered: "Cummings, take down a law!" There was another when the president vowed:

"I'm very fond of Eleanor, But I never read her column."

No mention was made of the Justice Black controversy until the last act, when nine black-robed "Justices" danced gaily across the stage and Chief Justice Hughes warned the ninth man in line:

"Hurry up, Justice Black. Remember, you've got to go on the air at 7:30 and do a little more explaining."

The satire apparently aroused no partisan resentment, and cries of "Speech! Speech!" rewarded Cohan—a very realistic looking Roosevelt—at the closing curtain. The veteran playwright, who has been on the stage since he made his debut in 1888 at the age of 10, thanked his audience briefly.

1358 CARS OF PEARS SHIPPED FROM VALLEY

SALVATION ARMY AID DEPENDS ON CHEST SUCCESS

Adjutant G. R. Durham of the Salvation Army, stated today that upon the success of this year's Community Chest campaign depends the organization's ability to continue to care for the hundreds of transient men who apply to the Army during the course of a year.

The adjutant said that the dormitory maintained by the Army for the men is too small to care for all applicants and that plans are ready for its enlargement. Execution of the plans depends upon the success of the chest in reaching the goal of \$20,000 during the forthcoming campaign, he stressed.

Plans for enlargement of the facilities call for a total of 18 cots, as against 9 at present; the installation of sanitary facilities in keeping with the enlarged capacity, showers and laundry facilities. Maintenance of the services to transients by the Army eliminates any necessity for citizens to assist panhandlers on the streets, inasmuch as any worthy man, willing to work, is provided with his night's lodging and temporary assistance with food and the opportunity to clean up in order that he may look for employment, Adjutant Durham said.

A typical case handled yesterday was cited by the adjutant. An elderly man, whose trade is lumber scaling and grading, fractured his hip in an accident from which he received no compensation. Released from the hospital a few days ago, he maintained himself at a respectable hotel until his funds were exhausted.

Knowing of no individual willing to assist, he turned to the Salvation Army. Upon investigation, it was found that he had been without food for 34 hours and had passed the previous night on a bench. A room was provided at a local hotel and meal orders were given on a nearby restaurant. Adjutant Durham said he

felt sure that some permanent plan could be worked out whereby the man can be sure of shelter and sufficient food.

According to Adjutant Durham, a gift to the Medford Community Chest in reality, a gift to the Salvation Army as well, for if the campaign succeeds, it insures the Army of sufficient funds to maintain this, as well as other branches of relief and welfare work for the forthcoming 12 months.

The proximity of the Tutetide was emphasized today when Rogue River national forest headquarters announced the sale of Christmas trees to San Francisco interests. Work of getting the trees out has already started.

To Pete Ferrari were sold 7,000 linear feet of Shasta fir in the Four-Mile lake area, enough for about

1,000 Christmas trees. Lester Bradshaw of Brownsboro is in charge of getting the trees out.

The Half Moon Fruit & Produce Co. bought 18,000 linear feet of Shasta fir in the Butte Falls section, enough for more than 2,000 Christmas trees. Peter Gouffly, from company headquarters, is in charge of cutting the trees for market.
