The men were sentenced in federal court here for various crimes to which they had pleaded guilty, most of them having sold liquor to Indians. Hanlin was accompanied by four guards.

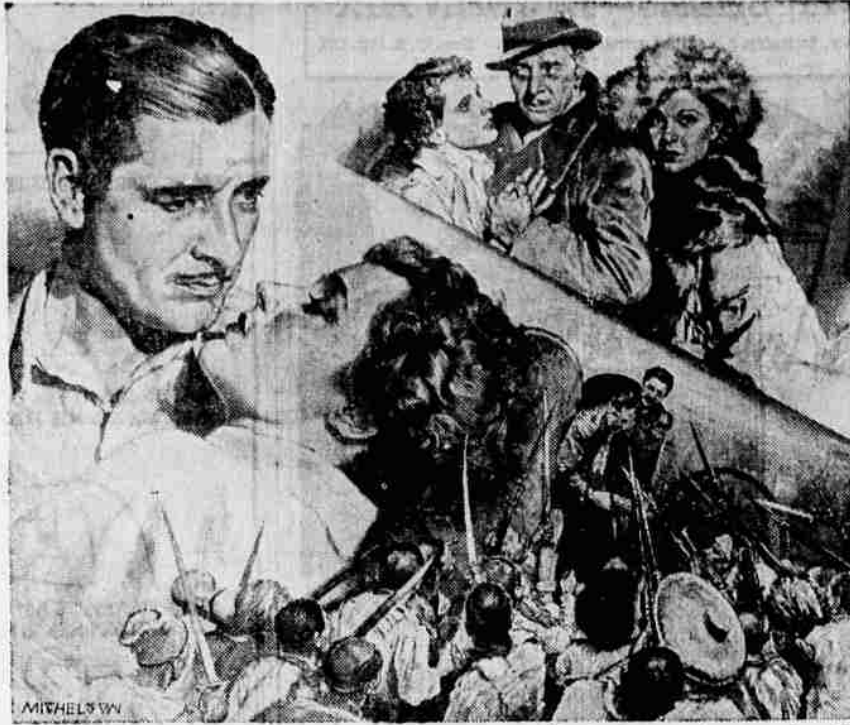

Monument for Butte Falls Dog

The Oregon Humane society desires that Shep of Butte Falls shall have a resting place, and a monument, beside Bobby of Silverton, who died some years ago. Bobby was the collie who, being lost in Indiana, made his way home to the Oregon town and established a record for such restlessness. Shep was the shepherd dog who saved his life a few days ago to rescue an infant child from the blazing cottage of a southern Oregon homesteader. And both were dogs of such sensibility, gentleness and courage as have endeared dogs to their people, since ever, as legend tells, an ancestor of theirs sprang across the widening chasm to be with Father Adam and Mother Eve when they were driven into exile from Eden.

The high and flawless courage of Shep, who paid the debt of love with his life, was exceptional—but so is such heroic self-sacrifice among our own kind. And Bobby, with affection as his compass, such fortitude, faith and endurance as he displayed in the long return to Silverton, are by no means commonplace among us. Considering the selfless devotion of such dogs as these, it seems not so strange that Alexander, when he lost a dog that he had loved, caused a city with temples to be erected as the dog's memorial. And, as in eclipse of Kipling's ballad of the last sunset, it is told that a dog belonging to one of Alexander's generals, who fell in battle on the plain of Corus, leaped into the funeral pyre of his master and so perished.

Myth, legend and history abound with stories of dogs that manifested traits which in men we should declare to be the hallmark of nobility.

These dogs were loyal and spiritual kin to the Butte Falls shepherd and the Silverton collie. It had been his dog before he went away to the state of Troy. It was still his dog—and none remembered him except this aged but loyal traveling.

By all means let there be a monument to Shep of Butte Falls, so that in after years, when people stand before it, reading the inscription, the stone will seem gently radiant with an inner light, and the wonder, beauty and pathos of the light will make them, no doubt of it, better men and women because a good dog rests there—Oregonian.
