

WPA OFFICIALS WILL BE FETED ON VISIT HERE

Chamber Commerce, Aeronautic Association Planning Program for Corrington Gill and Associates

Plans were being formulated here today by the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, Medford chapter of the National Aeronautic Association and other organizations for the entertainment of Corrington Gill, assistant WPA administrator, in Washington, D. C., and his associates when they come to this city October 23.

In a long distance telephone call today from Newark, N. J., to A. H. Benwell, chamber manager, now in Portland, Gill told Benwell, president of the National Association of State Aviation Officials, that the visit would be of the utmost importance to Medford. The telephone message was relayed to Mr. Benwell by chamber headquarters this afternoon.

Forum Lunch Set
Mr. Wilson asked that the chamber and assisting organizations proceed with making whatever plans they chose for the visitors. He indicated that the visiting delegation would make their plans coincide with the arrangements made here. The program of entertainment will include a forum lunch or dinner at the Hotel Medford, the chamber office stated.

The group will travel by private plane, main purpose of the trip being to inspect airports developed with WPA aid and to go over plans for future expansion.

Mr. Wilson said the party, in addition to Mr. Gill and himself, would include Col. Sumpter Smith, WPA aeronautical engineer; Howard Rough, assistant director of the bureau of air commerce; A. B. McMullen, chief of the airport section, bureau of air commerce; George W. Lewis, director of aeronautical research of the national advisory committee for aeronautics; Lester D. Gardner, secretary of the Institute of Aeronautical Sciences; and Charles Horner, president of the National Aeronautic Association.

Directors of Medford chapter of the National Aeronautic Association last night initiated plans for the entertainment of the visitors.
Mr. Corrington is chairman of a special committee to arrange for entertaining the party. The form of entertainment will depend upon the time of arrival and length of stay of the group and a telegram was sent today to national headquarters of the aeronautic association to procure this information.
Mr. Corrington is making an inspection tour of airports developed with WPA aid. He will inspect the work already done and go over future needs.

OPEN PORTLAND PLANT WITHOUT HOSTILITIES; 70 OFFICERS ON GUARD

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 14.—(AP)—Portland apparently had passed a crisis in the A. F. L.-C. I. O. lumber hostilities today when approximately 100 men entered the closed Plylock corporation plant under police protection and started the machinery.

Nearly 200 rival C. I. O. followers stood near the property as the officers checked in the workers, all presumably members of the federation. The massed C. I. O. unionists witnessed the opening with good humor, greeting their rivals with only occasional shouts.

J. A. Wright of Beaverton reported an automobile carrying unidentified passengers smashed the windows of his car with rocks as he approached the firm to work.

Captain Harry Circle commanded 70 city officers. Sheriff Martin Pratt of Multnomah county, three deputies and Captain Wayne Gurdane of the state police stood by as "observers." Governor Charles Martin has promised state police aid "if necessary." The possibility the plant may close down again followed a statement from Boyd Hundley of the A. F. L. "We'll have to close down if Mayor Joseph Carson fails to clean out the pickets," he said.

The Medford high school gym will be the stage for this year's annual Boy Scout rally.
Over six hundred Medford district scouts, their leaders, parents and friends will assemble Saturday at 7:30 p. m.
