JAMES W. JARVIS DIES IN ASHLAND

ASHLAND, Oct. 14.—(Sp.)—James William Jarvis passed away Wednesday at his home here, after an illness of two months.

The deceased was born June 14, 1855, in Indiana. He later married Mary Ollie, and they came to Ashland from Indiana in 1882. Ever since coming to this section of the country, Mr. Jarvis had been a school teacher and was one of the oldest in the county. He taught at Nell Creek and in Sams Valley. During the organization of the Bellview district, Mr. Jarvis was one of its most loyal promoters and helped to build the district. He was preceded in death by his wife in October, 1926.

Mr. Jarvis is survived by one son, Emmet Jarvis, San Fernando, Cal.; five daughters, Mrs. Jessie Lindsey, Ashland; Mrs. Leo Brock, Montezuma, Wash.; Mrs. Anita Parker and Mrs. Frank Rettus, San Francisco; and Mrs. George Nichols, Talent; eleven grandchildren, one great-granddaughter, and two sisters in Indiana.
