Navy-Columbia. Another tough one that calls for deep concentration and a telephone call to Frank Peril. Ah, it's Navy by 13-6.

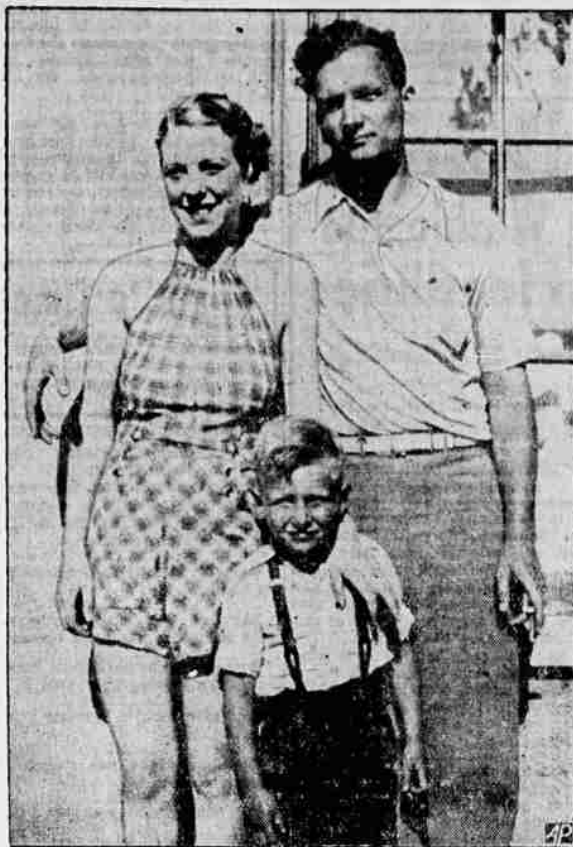
Idaho-Utah State. Idaho will cop after a fairly tough afternoon. Score, 7-0.

TACOMA, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Al Hostak, Seattle's fast moving middleweight, held a knockout over Otto Blackwell, Los Angeles negro, today. Hostak, 161½, whipped over three left hooks and followed with a right to the jaw in the third round last night of a scheduled 10-round bout to send Blackwell, 150½, sprawling to the floor for the count.

The whimsical, genial man, oft acclaimed as the unofficial poet laureate of the United States, died yesterday after a period of ill health that stretched back to the winter of 1935. He was 84 and had enjoyed a literary career that dated from post-Civil war days.
