

EPISCOPALIANS OPEN MOVE FOR UNITING OF ALL IN CHRISTIANITY

CINCINNATI, Oct. 15.—(P)—The Protestant Episcopal church pledged its cooperation today in a movement which some theologians hope eventually will unite the world in one Christian faith.

First, it invited the Presbyterian church in the U. S. A. to consider steps for achieving organic union, and second, it endorsed the proposed world council of churches and agreed to send two delegates to a preliminary conference in Holland in May, 1938.

At the same time, however, the church's triennial general convention here, through which the cooperative moves were made, decided not to join the federal council of churches of Christ in the United States until after the conference on the world council.

The invitation to the Presbyterians was said by informed churchmen to be the most important and definite step the Episcopal church has ever taken toward union with another denomination. It has been holding conversations with the Presbyterians and Methodists for several years, has approached the Lutherans, and is considering opening negotiations with the Reformed Episcopal church.

KANSAS CITY PICKETS DRIVE FORD PLANT OUT

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 15.—(P)—The Star today quoted Harry Bennett, Ford Motor company executive, as saying "as far as I am concerned we are all through in Kansas City," where the company's closed assembly plant has been picketed since Monday.

The paper said Bennett, personnel director of the company, said in a telephone conversation from Detroit: "As far as I am concerned, we are all through in Kansas City, and I believe I have something to say about it. That's all there is to it. We can't get police protection. The Ford Motor company doesn't work that way."

YOUTH RELEASED IN YOUNG GIRL'S DEATH

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Oct. 15.—(P)—Sheriff William J. Hoelski today released 20-year-old youth overnight about the fatal shooting of Melba Moore, 16, daughter of a village truck driver.

The Granger (Ind.) girl was wounded fatally late Tuesday night while she rode on a lonely road in an automobile with Stopper and Charles Walton, 17.

The sheriff said the young men contended an unidentified gunman, cursing with a foreign accent, opened fire on them when they stopped their automobile, believing him to be a motorist in trouble.

NATIONS TRAFFIC TOLL AHEAD OF LAST YEAR

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—(P)—The nation's auto traffic toll, despite "spotty improvement" in states and cities which have conducted vigorous safety campaigns, is running about 20 percent ahead of last year.

This estimate came today from the American Automobile association. It was based partly on fatality reports of the census bureau, which showed 5,905 fatalities in 125 cities above 50,000 population during the first 39 weeks this year, as compared with 5,234 in the same period of 1936. In the first 39 weeks of 1935, fatalities totaled 6,769 in the 125 cities.

EUGENE, Oct. 15.—(P)—John Henry Nash, famed San Francisco printer and book collector, will speak at ceremonies formally dedicating the University of Oregon's new \$400,000 library, October 23, M. H. Douglass, librarian, announced today.

Other speakers will include Oregon's senators, Charles L. McNary and Frederick Steiwer; Ellis F. Lawrence, dean of the school of architecture and allied arts, and university library architect, Chancellor Frederick M. Hunter; Dr. Burt Brown Barker, university vice-president, and Douglass.

**Many Last Rites On
Golden Gate Bridge**
SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 15.—(P)—Rites for the dead have become almost a commonplace on the Golden Gate bridge.

Captain Al Cassell, chief of the state highway patrol bridge detail, disclosed today that the ashes of 20 persons have been consigned to the sea from the span since its completion.

"A lot of people have asked permission to scatter ashes from the bridge," he said. "We never refuse. It's like a burial at sea, only nicer, in a way."

Dinosaur Bones Divided
YORK SPRINGS, Pa., (UP)—Stones bearing imprints of prehistoric dinosaurs discovered near here several months ago, have been divided among representatives from the Carnegie Institute of Technology, Pittsburgh; National Museum, Washington, D. C.; Pennsylvania State Museum, Harrisburg, and the Gettysburg National Military Park office.
