SKULL IS FRACTURED WHEN TRUCK UPSETS ON NORTH RIVERSIDE

Mrs. Jack Barbour, 48, of 2002 First avenue, Seattle, is confined in Community hospital today with a fractured skull and minor neck and back injuries, the result of an accident yesterday at about 3 p. m., when a meat truck driven by her husband skidded and overturned at the intersection of Stewart avenue and the Pacific highway.

Attending physician said today that Mrs. Barbour was resting comfortably, and he believed, was in no danger. The fracture, he stated, was apparently not serious. Mr. Barbour received multiple bruises, but was not badly hurt, the physician said.

According to a city police report of the accident, Barbour started to pass another machine at the intersection of Stewart avenue while driving north on the Pacific highway at the same time the other vehicle attempted to make a left turn into

Stewart avenue. Barbour reported that he applied his brakes suddenly, and the slippery condition of the pavement caused his truck to skid and turn over twice. Both were rushed to Community hospital. Identity of the second car was not known.
