

CITY'S MINISTERS PLAN SCHOOL FOR CHURCH OFFICERS

Leadership Classes to Be Conducted Two Nights a Week for Three Weeks, Starting Last of January

At the regular monthly meeting of the Medford Ministers' Association this week, plans were approved for conducting a union school of leadership training for church officers and teachers.

The school will meet two nights a week for three weeks beginning the last week in January. The committee responsible for the school is Rev. James M. Hamilton, pastor of the Christian church; Rev. E. S. Bartlam, pastor of the Episcopal church and Rev. Joseph Knotts, pastor of the M. E. church.

Pastors and superintendents of the Sunday schools of the community will co-operate in perfecting plans for the school in the selection of courses and instructors, in keeping with the standards of the International Council of Religious Education of Chicago. The council is the co-operative agency for more than fifty religious bodies.

The local Ministers' association voted to co-operate with the community chest drive for funds, the membership drive of the Parent-Teachers association, and Girl Scout week, beginning October 31. Plans were also made for a union Thanksgiving service to be held Thanksgiving day at 10 a. m. in the Christian church, with Dr. S. L. Divine, pastor of the Presbyterian church, preaching the sermon.

The Rev. J. P. Bray, new minister of the local Main Street M. E. church, South, was voted into membership of the association.

ABBEY SHOWING NEW 1938 NASH

An even total of 86,000 1937 model cars, more than double the number of 1936 models, was manufactured by Nash Motors during the 1937 model year, it was announced by Walter W. Abbey, local dealer, who just returned from the Nash convention in Chicago.

This gain, he said, is one of the most sensational business increases in the recent history of the automobile industry. It represents 100.2 per cent increase over the Nash Motors business in 1936, when 42,989 cars were built, he stated.

Distributors from every state and Canada were at the convention, at which the new 1938 cars were unveiled for the sales organization. Guards stood watch over the convention hall preventing prying eyes from seeing the new automobiles, which are reported to contain conditioned air systems for winter driving. These are the first cars to be presented with this modern convenience, and the system is being guarded until public announcement of the 1938 Nash models later in the month.

Complete description of the conditioned air system for winter driving was not revealed to the public by the Nash officials, but the innovation was widely cheered by the 1450 distributors and members of their parties when it was presented. It is known that the system represents the first application of thermo-dynamics to the interior of an automobile.

The system, they point out, is based upon entirely new principles of car ventilation and heating, and establishes an entirely new conception of motoring comfort.

Nash presents 38 new features for 1938, according to Abbey, who brought back three new models which are now on display at the new Nash showroom. The new models here include a new Nash LaFayette opera coupe, a Nash Ambassador 8 sedan and a Nash Ambassador 6 sedan.

BUDGET DRAFTERS EXPECT TO FINISH TASK BY TONIGHT

Road and Relief Expense Last Items to Be Considered—No Definite Action On Varmint Control

The Jackson county budget committee met again today and expected to have the final draft of the 1938 edition completed by night.

Road and relief comprise the last two items to be considered and no great difficulty is anticipated. The relief fund for old age assistance, last year listed at \$53,000, is due for a \$11,000 boost, due to reduction of the age limit to 65 years by the last legislature. The increase is expected to provide for the increased number of eligible applicants.

Discussion included an increase in the road fund to provide for extension of the road oiling program, possible inclusion of three new market road projects and standardization of road improvements, with safety factors stressed. Last winter's storms caused considerable damage to roads, which should be repaired and improved.

No Varmint Action
No definite action was taken by the budget committee yesterday on the question of employment of federal varmint hunters, instead of the present bounty system, for eradication of animals preying on stock in Jackson county. A large number of stockmen and a representative of the U. S. biological survey attended the session.

The budget committee offered to employ the hunters and abolish the bounty system, provided five hunters would be employed, with county payments at \$500 per year. The wild animal bounty fund was \$4000 last year and means a \$1000 per year saving. The federal bureau can provide but two hunters—possibly three. The matter was deferred until a more definite answer could be made by the government agency.

It was also suggested, without final action, that Vern Hopkins, Dead Indian district champion coyote and varmint killer, be "deputized." Hopkins annually slays on an average of 100 varmints, county records show.
