Answer—The vitamin D inhalant or nose drops (which may not have cleared up the cough. I do recommend the use of three or four drops of it in the nose two or three times a day as a good remedy in the onset of nose infections with or without cough.

Answer—Open air rest treatment similar to that usually followed for early tuberculosis. Plenty of calcium in diet—milk, cheese, eggs, peas, beans, greens—perhaps medicinal calcium as well—in some cases iodine ration.
