Mrs. J. Verne Shangie and her committee were in charge of the social hour following the business meeting and program.

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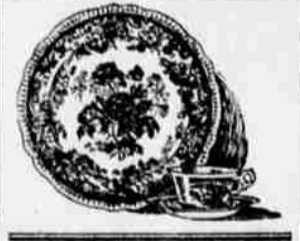
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
