CORVALLIS, Oct. 16—(AP)—The Oregon State College Dads' club recommended the appointment of a special committee today to ask the board of higher education to reconsider the student educational activities fee and make it compulsory.  
Another main objective formally approved by the organization calls for efforts toward obtaining a new chemistry building. The club said it was necessary to the health and safety of students as well as efficient work. The dads also considered plans to assist the women's cooperative houses, which now enable some 75 coeds to attend college through reducing living expenses.
