senior senator from Virginia, Carter Glass, will always desire the nation's gratitude.

Glass was instrumental in creation of the reserve system.

Re-organizing his often-expressed goal of gaining "for all our people the greatest attainable measure of economic well-being and the largest degree of economic security and stability," the chief executive continued:

"To advance the country towards this goal is the real mission of the federal reserve system.

"It cannot be attained by that system alone, but neither can it be reached without the proper functioning of our monetary and credit machinery.

Must Steadily Improve "That machinery must be steadily perfected and coordinated with all other instruments of government to promote the most productive utilization of our human and material resources.

"Only in that way can we hope to achieve and maintain an enduring prosperity, free from the disastrous extremes of booms and depressions.

"Only in that way can our economic system and our democratic institutions endure."

Tracing developments through the 1920's, the president said that changes in the banking system in that period would have tended "to moderate the forces that brought about the great depression."

Then, after citing changes in the reserve system in recent years, the president asserted that the system "is a piece of machinery vital to the nation's steady progress towards the goal of a sounder banking system capable of contributing its full share to lasting economic progress and well-being."

TIMOTHY'S CANE FOUND ON BRIDGE NEAR GOLD HILL

A crooked and knarled Manzanita walking stick, uncovered yesterday afternoon, furnished the only definite clue to the possible whereabouts of George O. Timothy, 87-year-old former Medford police chief, as state, county and city authorities today continued their search for the aged and feeble man who disappeared last Saturday afternoon after getting off a Pacific Greyhound stage in Gold Hill.

The stick had been discovered on the bridge which spans Rogue river just this side of Gold Hill, by several little girls last Saturday afternoon. Joe Cave, city policeman engaged in the search, visited a Gold Hill school yesterday and recovered the stick from the girls, who had taken it home to play with. It was identified by Mrs. Bel F. Richardson, step-daughter of Timothy, as one he had used often.

Focal point of the search continued along the banks of Rogue river and in the 60-foot deep channel directly below the concrete bridge where the walking stick was found. A dynamite blast set off in the river at that point yesterday failed to bring anything to the surface except three carp. Grappling hooks were also used without success.

Sheriff Syd L. Brown, who yesterday stated he feared Timothy had taken his own life because of brooding over the condition of his invalid wife, said that the same crew of searchers were working today. They include Deputy Sheriff Bill Greenbush, State Policeman, P. S. LaDue and City Policeman Joe Cave. In addition, several Gold Hill residents were aiding in the search, the sheriff reported.

Timothy, ill for many months and in a feeble condition, left his home at 1105 West Main street Saturday where he and his wife were under the care of Miss Lottie Watkins, and walked to town where he purchased a stage ticket for Gold Hill. Investigation revealed he got off the stage about 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon, but authorities have been unable to find a trace of him since then.

Because of a note left for Mrs. Richardson Saturday in which Timothy stated he "was going for a long walk and might not get back," grave concern is felt by authorities that the well-liked and long-time Medford resident has taken his own life. Sheriff Brown stated today that if such was the case and his body was not recovered by searchers, it would be ten days before it rose to the surface of the river, if it were free. Today is the fourth day of the search and the fifth since Timothy disappeared.
