ASHLAND, Oct. 21. — (Sp.) — The fall convention of the first district Federation of Women's Clubs was held at the Ashland Civic club house in Ashland October 18. The meeting was called to order by the district president, Mrs. Kathleen Macneel Clarke of Grants Pass; Mrs. T. S. O'Hare, president of the Ashland Civic club, welcomed the delegates and guests from most of the clubs of the district.

After the minutes of the spring meeting had been read and approved, the retiring president, in a genial address, stressed advantages of the federation and urged support of the official magazine, the "Oregon Clubwoman." The report of Miss Grace Chamberlain, secretary-treasurer, was read in her unavoidable absence, by Mrs. John Fuller, acting secretary. It showed 287 members from nine clubs in the district and a balance of \$14.90 in the bank.

At the spring meeting it had been decided that contributions from the individual clubs should no longer be pooled but that each club should feel free to give to those state projects in which they were most interested. ## COMPANY A RESUMES WEEKLY DRILLS; CALL ISSUED FOR RECRUITS

Regular weekly drill sessions for Company A, 156th infantry, of the Oregon national guard will be continued next Tuesday night at the armory under a full-time schedule. It was announced today by Capt. Carl Y. Tengwald, company commander.

The company held its first regular pay drill last Tuesday night following a six weeks' layoff given the troop shortly after its return from the annual encampment at Camp Murray, Wash. Future drills, Capt. Tengwald said, will be conducted in accordance with the annual winter program and will comprise all phases of military subjects that can be executed indoors. It is possible that classes in special subjects will be held to acquaint recruits with various phases of the service, the captain added.

Virtual reorganization of the company will be undertaken in the near future, Captain Tengwald stated, adding that there is a large number of vacancies to be filled. An excellent opportunity for young men over 18 years of age to acquaint themselves with the military service is now afforded, and detailed information regarding enlistment in the company is available at the armory, he said.
