

# GEORGE VI VOICES DEEP DISTRESS AT JAPANESE ACTIONS

### Message Closing Historic Parliament Session Details Government's Efforts To Isolate Spain.

LONDON, Oct. 22.—(AP)—King George VI officially closed today a historic parliamentary session—which his brother, now the Duke of Windsor, had opened last November 3—with a message reflecting "distress" at air and sea attacks on Chinese noncombatants.

The king's message proroguing parliament was read to assembled commons and lords by Lord Chancellor Halifax.

It detailed the government's "persistence" in efforts to isolate warring Spain and noted "with satisfaction" the strengthening of all three of my defense forces.

On Tuesday the king comes in person to the house of lords to open the new parliament session, and it was thought he would himself read the opening speech from the throne.

The session which closed today carried England through the abdication of Edward VIII, and through George's accession and coronation. Actually it had been in summer adjournment from July 30 until yesterday.

George's message today did not mention Windsor. It began, "The queen and I," and contained the familiar phrase, "My relations with foreign powers continue to be friendly."

Dealing with the Chinese-Japanese warfare, the monarch expressed the hope that the nine-power conference meeting in Brussels October 30 "may contribute to bring this deplorable conflict to an end."

Just before that he had said "I have seen with greatest concern the development of hostilities between Japan and China. Sufferings which have been inflicted upon innocent noncombatants by attacks from the air and sea have caused me particular distress."

# JACK GARR FREED IN MURDER TRIAL

SHREVEPORT, Ky., Oct. 22.—(AP)—The murder charge against Jack Garr was dismissed today but the fate of his brother, Roy, who admitted shooting Brig. Gen. Henry H. Denhardt, was left to the jury.

Circuit Judge Charles C. Marshall sustained a defense motion to free Jack, the youngest of the three brothers charged with shooting the world war veteran accused of slaying his sister.

Dr. E. S. Garr, the third brother, was not called to trial at this time and his counsel reported the veterinarian, who suffered shell shock during the world war was in a private sanitarium.

The defense today offered additional testimony designed to show that Roy Garr was emotionally insane when he shot Denhardt here the night of last September 20.

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(Continued from Page One) down-side of the stocks, it at least helped it along, friends of the new deal offer a chain of events:

First, the plain in financial circles that needs for business loans would necessitate checking large-scale bond operations by the treasury. Then, the charges by Charles Gay that SEC regulations had created a "thin" market and Winthrop Aldrich's blaming government regulation for impairing the market machinery. Shortly thereafter, the Chase National bank sponsored Neil Carothers, Lehigh University economist and anti-new dealer, on a nation-wide hook-up. The National Association of Manufacturers started a campaign of "education" in the north and the "committee for cotton," with objectives hostile to the new deal, was organized in the south. Finally, the American Bankers' association elected a president known for his opposition to the administration's fiscal policies.

All this, say the new dealers, ties in with Republican campaign speeches. The president can, at any time, dissolve the RFC as a lending unit, as he has indicated he will.

That may go quite a way toward balancing the budget, but it doesn't settle another problem, namely, what to do with the far from dissoluble Jesse Jones.

Friends of Jesse Jones will tell you that he is by no means ready to retire to private life. He has energy and ambition, plus.

They will also tell you that he is young enough and able enough to be president, to say nothing of vice-president. He has some exceedingly good friends in some exceedingly high places, and places where the new deal is not such a welcome subject of discussion.

But it is admitted, too, that he hasn't the qualities to arouse a popular following, which some politicians, who have already looked into the matter pretty thoroughly, declare are necessary for the winning of a national election.

As one man, high up in the democratic ranks and a good friend of Jones, put it: "If presidents were appointed, Jesse Jones would have a good chance, and the country would have a good president."

The wind that rustles the tall corn of Iowa carries a strange message into Washington: "Wallace for senator."

This somewhat anti-climactic appeal to the secretary of agriculture, who is credited with far higher ambitions, is based on the fact that Republican Iowa is beginning to feel its Republican oats again. The Democrats had a close scrape to elect a democratic governor last time.

# WIFE OF TIMOTHY DIES FROM SHOCK OF DISAPPEARANCE

(Continued from Page One) southern Oregon who will grieve her passing.

George O. Timothy, ill himself and brooding over the condition of his invalid wife, left their home last Saturday afternoon and has been the object of an intensive search since. Before he left, he wrote a note to his step-daughter, Mrs. Bel F. Richardson, which stated, "Bel, I can't stand to see her suffer so I'm going for a long walk and may not get back." Those close to Timothy believe it was his wife to whom he referred.

The note, left on his dresser in his room, was discovered by Miss Watkins, the couple's nurse. She immediately notified authorities and it was discovered Timothy had purchased a stage ticket for Gold Hill, had disembarked from the bus, and walked feebly toward the Rogue river. Since then, state, county and city authorities and citizens of Gold Hill have searched in vain for the aged man, former Medford police chief.

Timothy had been a patient in Community hospital for seven months this summer, suffering from a weak heart. He is 87 years old. Mrs. Timothy, an invalid for a long time and whose eyesight and hearing were failing rapidly, was told none of the details of the search for her husband. She realized, however, that he had left home, and her condition grew more critical with each passing day. Miss Watkins said she remained

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quiet, and with the exception of crying violently last Sunday, had been extremely brave through it all. The search for George Timothy entered its sixth day this morning, with authorities still reporting no success. County sheriff's office stated the banks of Rogue river and the river, itself, were being closely watched in the vicinity of Gold Hill.
