DEVELOPMENT OF AIRPORT PLEDGED BY WPA ENGINEER

Aeronautic Group Confer Saturday On Future Plans—Seek Funds.

Earnest consideration of development needs at Medford municipal airport was pledged yesterday by Col. Sumpter S. Smith, chief aeronautic engineer for WPA in Washington, D. C.

Col. Smith, head of the group, conferred with Mr. Schoffel and went over plans and specifications of the airport. He took with him a copy of the plans and a brief outlining the requirements that must be met to maintain the field plant on a first class rating.

Further developments of the airport are part of an active WPA project and await only the allocation of funds to carry them out, Mr. Schoffel explained. What is urgently needed, he informed the colonel, is a \$12,000 allotment for widening the main runway.

Others in the visiting group were Howard Rough, assistant director of the bureau of air commerce; A. B. McMullen, chief of the airport division, bureau of air commerce; George W. Lewis, director of aeronautical research of the national advisory committee for aeronautics; Fred L. Smith, executive of the National Aeronautic association; Gill Robb Wilson, president of the National association of State Aviation Officials and manager of the country's largest airport at Newark, N. J.; Lester D. Gardner, secretary of the Institute of Aeronautical Sciences; J. Frank Robinson; Burton J. Palmer, WPA regional executive; Col. Earl Popp, regional inspector of the bureau of air commerce; and Dr. Raymond B. Staub of Portland, member of the Oregon state board of aeronautics.

The group arrived from Portland at 12:25 in an army transport plane piloted by Capt. E. A. Hillery, with Lieut. F. D. Stevens as co-pilot, both officers being from Langley field, Va.

The visitors were met by city, county and Jackson County Chamber of Commerce officials and executives of Medford chapter of the National Aeronautic association.

Corrington Gill, assistant WPA administrator in Washington, D. C., headed the group at the start of a nation-wide inspection tour but was stricken en route to the west with tonsillitis. He remained in Salt Lake City to have his tonsils excised.

The visitors were served an all-southern-Oregon luncheon in the airport cafe. The menu included Rogue river valley tomato juice, Jackson county pear salad, Rogue river trout and Jackson county pheasant and venison. The novel lunch impressed the visitors and they spoke highly of Medford's hospitality.

The luncheon was prepared by Fred Powell and service was supervised by Mamie Burnette, cafeteria hostess.

At the luncheon A. H. Banwell, manager of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, presented Mayor C. C. Farnas, A. S. V. Carpenter, chamber finance committee head, Judge Earl B. Day and Mr. Wilson.

Each gave a brief talk, Mr. Wilson complimenting Medford on its airport and declaring that the city is known nationally for its high aviation standards.

The visitors left for the south at 2:20.

ARNSPIGER, JUDD NAMED TO WATER DISTRICT POSTS

PORTLAND, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Members of the Oregon reclamation congress drove to Bonneville dam today, with completion of business sessions of the 27th annual meeting here Friday.

Frank Morgan, Nyama, became president of the congress, succeeding Robert W. Sawyer of Bend, who retired at his own wish.

The congress went on record favoring a sliding scale of repayments to the government of costs of irrigation projects by water users, based on one to nine per cent of the average gross crop incomes over a 10-year period.

The group pledged its support of the Willamette valley project, and urged liberalization and explanation of the federal land bank's long-term loans for reclamation activities.

Another resolution bearing on the proposed establishment of regional authorities throughout the nation, urged that any federal program should tend to strengthen, rather than hamper, the reclamation bureau. The proposed "little TVA's" should not cause existing state agencies to lose their identities, officers said.

District officers included: First district—Olen Arnspiger, Medford, vice president; Reed Carter, Grants Pass, Dan McClellan, Salem, E. H. Judd, Medford, and M. H. Lewis, Corvallis, directors.

ADELINE ROSTEL FUNERAL TODAY

Funeral services will be held in Mt. Shasta, Calif., this (Sunday) afternoon at 2 o'clock for Mrs. Adeline Rostel, well known Siskiyou county pioneer. She died suddenly Thursday morning at her Mt. Shasta home where she had resided since 1884.

Mrs. Rostel was the wife of Herman Rostel who died in 1907, and since that time she has been managing business interests left by him.

She is known to a number of old time southern Oregon residents and in the past 50 years had made trips to Jackson county. She leaves no children to mourn her passing, but has a number of nephews and nieces in Oregon and California, including Bert C. Rostel of Klamath Falls, and Ernest A. Rostel of Crater Lake and their families.

She was a sister-in-law of the late C. B. Rostel, who came to Jacksonville in 1876 and died in Central Point in 1928.

KRAAI ACQUITTED OF GIRL CHARGE

Jake Kraai, northern California resident charged with a statutory offense against his niece, a 15-year-old Shasta Valley girl, was acquitted by a circuit court jury late Friday, after short deliberations. Walter Rowley was foreman.

According to courthouse reports, three ballots were taken—the first two standing 11 to 1 for acquittal. Medical testimony at the trial showed the complaining witness to be in a delicate condition. The trial lasted two days, attorneys Charles W. Reames and Harry Skyrman appeared for the defense.

HUNTING MISHAP INJURES BOY, 16

Three boys went bird hunting near Phoenix yesterday. One of them lay in Sacred Heart hospital last night, victim of an accidental discharge of his 12-gauge shotgun.

The victim was Charles Nelson, 16, Medford high school junior and son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Nelson of Route 4. Result of the accident might be a crippled right foot, it was stated by Dr. W. G. Bishop, attending physician.

Nelson went hunting with Fred Stevens, high school football center, and James Hickman. When they were hunting near Phoenix about 3 o'clock, Nelson fell into a hole. His gun, held over his shoulder, fell to the ground behind him. It discharged and the wadding and shot tore into the bottom of his right foot.

His companions rushed him in their car to Dr. Bishop. At his office the doctor extracted some of the wadding, pellets and dirt that had become imbedded. Sole of his shoe slackened the force of the shot and the pellets did not penetrate through his foot.

The boy was removed to the hospital where Dr. Bishop operated last evening and removed other shot, wadding and dirt. An X-ray was to be taken to determine whether any other foreign material remained in the foot.

The shots tore the sole of the foot somewhat, the doctor said, adding that the pellets entered at an angle toward the toes. The youth was reported as resting as comfortably as could be expected last night.

Nelson has been playing football at the high school. He will be out of the game for the remainder of the season at least, Dr. Bishop said.

FINAL RITES FOR MRS. TIMOTHY TO BE HELD MONDAY

Funeral services for Florence Timothy, 82, who died Thursday night of paralysis following shock caused by the disappearance of her husband, George O. Timothy, Oct. 16, will be held at the Conger funeral parlors Monday at two p. m. The Rev. E. S. Bartlam will have charge of the services and interment will be in the Medford I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Sheriff Syd I. Brown, conducting the search for Timothy, 87-year-old former Medford police chief who is believed to have taken his own life by drowning in the Rogue river near Gold Hill, stated last night that no new clues had been discovered. The "watchful waiting" policy adopted by authorities would be continued today, the sheriff said.

There was a possibility, Sheriff Brown remarked, that a diving suit would be brought into operation to search the 60-foot deep river channel directly under the Gold Hill bridge. Attempts were being made to procure the diving apparatus, the sheriff explained. Timothy, who has been missing since late in the afternoon of Oct. 16 when he was seen disembarking from a stage in Gold Hill after intimating in a note he was going to take his own life, is believed by searchers to have died in Rogue river. His walking stick, positively identified by Mrs. Bel F. Richardson, was found on the bridge spanning the river.
