But, after all, what really matters is not what you are, not where you are, but what you want to be, for if there is a sincere desire it can be accomplished.

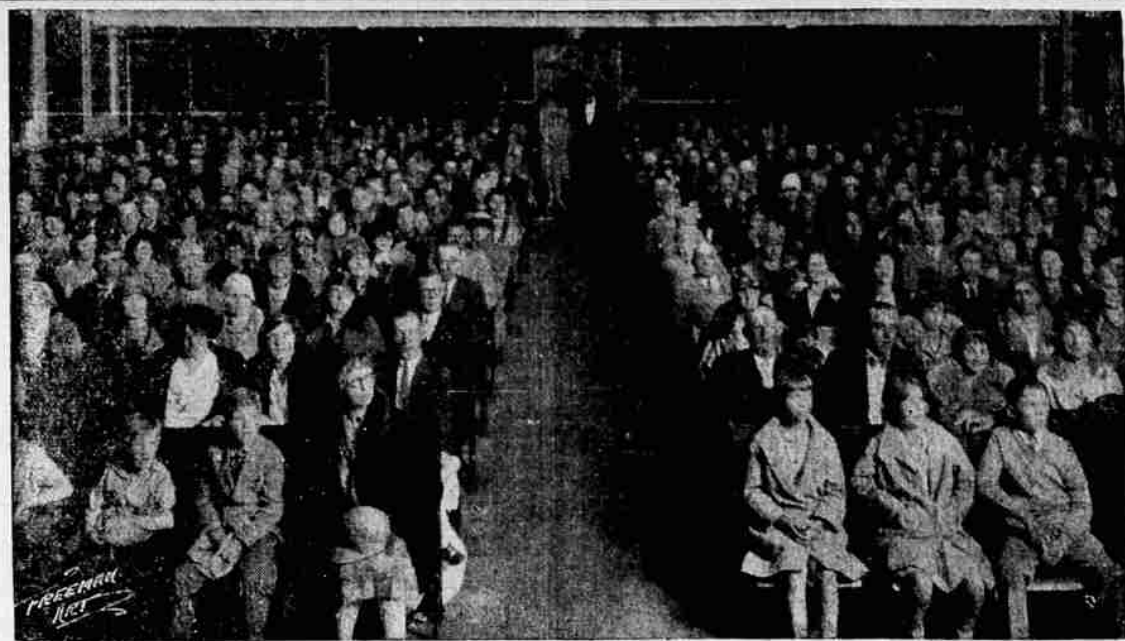
It is perfectly natural and easy to be well, happy and successful through methods of right living and right thinking.

BEAUTY DROPS SUIT FOR \$200,000 BALM FROM BASSO PINZA

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Elio Pinza, the opera basso, was astounded again today by Miss Octavia Picchioni, San Francisco Italian beauty, when she dismissed her \$200,000 breach of promise suit as suddenly as she brought it a year ago.

The handsome Pinza, accompanied by his lawyers, was in court to defend himself against Miss Picchioni's charge when informed the suit had been withdrawn.

Pinza looked astonished, just as astonished as he did last year when process servers caught him at the War Memorial opera house, but he made no immediate comment.

The dismissal was filed in the court clerk's office by Harry A. McKenzie, attorney for the seldom-seen but reportedly dark-eyed glamor woman of the Italian colony.

Superior Judge E. E. Robinson stated the requested dismissal seemed "very odd—the jury is here, we are ready to proceed." He ordered the 12 jurors paid their \$2 each and dismissed them.

Though the dismissal eliminated his announced plans to prove the suit was a "frame-up," Pinza came from the court room declaring he was "delighted" that the case had been dropped.
