Relaxation Prime Beauty Essential Says Mrs. Sweet

"Sit still and fix your face so it will feel that it looks pretty."

This is one of the exercises advocated by Viola Sweet, who begins Wednesday evening a course of free lectures under the auspices of the Medford Mail Tribune at the Guild hall on North Oakdale, on "The Game of Life and How to Play It."

"This exercise isn't as foolish as it sounds," declared Mrs. Sweet. "The very act of fixing one's face so it feels that it looks pretty causes relaxation in both body and mind, and relaxation is something that is especially necessary in this speedy world today."

"Most people do not realize how tenseness interferes with good looks but a glance into a mirror when one is tense will show just what it really does physically. Unfortunately, no mirror will show what it does to the nerves and entire system."

While associated with Dr. Julian Pennington, the celebrated vocational expert of Birmingham, Ala., Mrs. Sweet saw what could be done in the vocational world and she has been applying the same principles in her own work in helping people adjust their lives to the world in which they live.

The first talk of the evening series will be Wednesday evening, October 27, with the subject "How to Get What You Want." The first talk of the morning series will be given at the Guild hall Thursday, October 28, at 10 o'clock on "How to Keep Young." Mrs. Sweet will explain how one may retain or regain youth. She urges that we think of life as a beautiful maturing, not as a process

of deterioration and decay. In order to remain youthful one must have good health, which involves both physical and mental laws. We must develop youth and beauty from within and get away from relying solely on external means.

"The Story Your Face Tells" is the subject Friday morning at 10 o'clock. All lectures, morning and evening, are given in the Guild hall. They are free and no collection is taken. A cordial invitation is extended to everyone.

JACKSON CO. LEVY OF \$432,609 SET FOR BUDGET USE

The Jackson county total on the levy for 1938, as provided in the Jackson county budget, will approximate \$432,609.15. Minor changes and revisions are being made today preparatory to certification of the budget at the regular session of the county court and budget committee.

The figure represents an estimated increase of \$19,000 over last year, due to increase in road funds and relief funds, members of the budget committee said.

The 1938 relief appropriations total \$24,873, an increase of \$4,000 over 1937. For old age assistance \$44,100 is appropriated, an increase of \$11,000 made necessary by legislative action reducing the age limit to 65 years. Other relief funds were cut, reducing the total relief gain to approximately \$4,000.

Chief increases in the county road fund were due to repair of bridges and roads, made necessary by deterioration during depression economy and public demands for new routes.

The general county fund for 1938 is fixed at \$233,527.26, a decrease of \$22,213.76 from the 1937 appropriations.

Appropriations for county offices and departments are approximately the same as last year.

The county assessor has estimated the tax levy will be about the same as last year, when it was 14.5 mills for state and county levies.
