ADJOURN MEETING WHEN BOTH SIDES REJECT PROPOSALS

CIO Negotiator Says Recess Not Permanent — AFL Plan Suggested Abject Surrender Is Assertion.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Labor's peace conference recessed today until November 4 after each side had turned down the other's peace proposal.
Harvey Fremming, one of the CIO organization negotiators said the recess was "in no way considered a permanent disagreement."

POWER COST BASIS IS APPROVED FOR BONNEVILLE DAM

Roosevelt Sanctions Interest Rate Of 3-1-2 Percent And 40-year Amortization Plan—Data Ready Soon.
HYDE PARK, N. Y., Oct. 27.—(AP)—J. D. Ross, administrator of the Bonneville, Ore., power project, announced today that President Roosevelt had approved a 3 1/2 percent interest rate and 40-year amortization plan as the basis for fixing rates for Bonneville power.
Ross, one of the president's chief advisors on power matters, said he hoped the same interest and amortization—paying back the capital cost—plan could be applied to all federal power projects.

U. S. and Britain to Fire in Self Defense; Japs Refuse Participation in Peace Meet

ORDER IS ISSUED AS HOT FIGHTING RAGES IN CHAPEL
LONDON, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, amid cheers in the house of commons, said today that Britain had told Japan she must "always" expect retaliatory fire if there be any repetition of the fatal attack on a British post in Shanghai on October 24.
Eden declared that the air attack in which one soldier was killed, was "inexcusable" and said that the British were "entirely justified" in shooting at the airplane.

HOOVER REPEATS DEMAND FOR NEW G.O.P. PLATFORM

Ex-President Renews Effort To Obtain National Convention—"Mighty Service To Be Performed."
BOSTON, Oct. 27.—(AP)—The Republican party had a fresh demand today from Herbert Hoover for a national convention to draft a new platform of "positive and affirmative principles."

NIPPONESE ARGUE CONFERENCE WILL HINDER SOLUTION

TOKYO, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Japan formally declined today the invitation to participate in the Brussels conference of nine-power pact adherents on the Chinese-Japanese war.
A note handed to Belgian Ambassador Baron Ailbers de Bascompiere declared the conference was inspired by the League of Nations and would "put serious obstacles in the path of the just and proper solution" of the conflict.

ST. HELENS, Ore., Oct. 27.—(AP)—District Attorney David Bennett of Columbia county said Mrs. Agnes Joan Ledford, 35, was being held without bail on information filed by Sheriff M. R. Calhoun charging her with first degree murder in connection with the deaths last month of her step-daughters, Dorothy, 18, and Ruth, 15.
Ruth died in St. Helens, September 6, her sister in a Portland hospital two days later.

BUDGET HEARING SET FOR NOVEMBER 19 AT COUNTY COURT HOUSE

At the public hearing, the various items will be read and explained. The budget provides for \$432,609.15 on the tax levy, an increase of about \$20,000 over last year, due chiefly to age assistance pension and road fund increases.

11 BODIES REMOVED FROM ALASKA MINE AFTER HEAVY BLAST

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Eleven bodies of miners killed in an explosion in the Evan Jones coal mine were brought to Anchorage today, leaving the fate of three others still undetermined.
Five bodies were removed from the mine during the night, in addition to the six found shortly after the unexplained blast ripped through the mine yesterday.

Crater Lake Park Is Handicapped By Its Isolation

PORTLAND, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Crater unequalled in any of the other 23 national parks, would attract a record-breaking number of visitors if located near a densely populated area, Arno B. Cammerer, director of national park service, told interviewers here.
Despite its more or less isolated position, Cammerer said, Crater lake drew 302,000 persons in three months this year, an average of 3,000 a day.
