BROADEN INQUIRY IN POISON DEATHS

PORTLAND, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Investigation into the deaths of Ruth, 13, and Dorothy Ledford, 15, climaxed by the arrest Tuesday night of their step-mother, Mrs. Agnes Ledford on a first degree murder charge, was extended today to include the death of her former husband, John Matson, in 1932. District Attorney David Bennett of Columbia county, said no charges had been filed in connection with Matson's death, which occurred in 1932, and was attributed to acute gastritis. Bennett asserted that Matson's body had been exhumed and traces of poison discovered.

ELEVEN OSC INVADERS PAY \$5 TRAFFIC FINES—CORVALLIS, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Eleven Oregon State college students paid \$5 fines in justice court yesterday for the return trip from Monday's Eugene invasion.

EX-ROSEBURG BANKER INDICTED IN SHORTAGE

PORTLAND, Oct. 28.—(AP)—The federal grand jury indicted Edwin S. Booth on 21 counts today in connection with the alleged shortage of funds at the Douglas National bank of Roseburg. The first count accused Booth, son of a prominent Roseburg family and a former officer of the bank, with misappropriating \$1000 and the second with abstracting \$800. The other charges involved alleged false entries.

A. J. VANCE, FORMER PHONE CHIEF HERE, PASSES IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Funeral services will be held Thursday for Alva James Vance, 68, retired telephone company official, who died in a local hospital yesterday. He resided 13 years in Medford before being transferred to Portland in 1924.

A. J. Vance was manager of the Home Telephone and Telegraph company of southern Oregon here from 1911 until the world war broke out. Upon his return from France in 1919, he again resumed his position which he held until leaving Medford in 1924. While he was in France, R. B. Hammond, present manager of the local office of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, acted in Vance's capacity and when Vance left the city, Hammond became manager.

Vance was captain of the Seventh company, Coast Artillery corps in Medford previous to the world war, and led his company into action in France. He commanded the company seven years.
