

# Why Indians Feared Crater Is Revealed in Old Legend

There's a legend that's never been written about Crater lake, and Prof. Irving Vining of Ashland loves to tell the story. He told it to the Pioneer society at its annual meeting in Ashland this month.

Mr. Vining heard the story from Joaquin Miller, famed western poet, as they sat around a campfire on Cherry creek in the Crater lake area long ago. The legend had been told to Joaquin Miller by an old chief, and relates why the Indians were afraid to look upon the blue waters of the lake.

"I like this story because it deals with human emotions, rather than with gods, as does William Stead's legend," Mr. Vining said.

In early days the Indians of the northwest were well organized under Chief Multnomah, who dwelt on an island in the Columbia river. Multnomah possessed little young runners who were ever on the alert to carry messages to all sections of his kingdom. In those days it was customary for an Indian youth, upon reaching adolescence, to leave the tutelage of his father and go forth, without food, in search of a god in spirit to be his leading inspiration.

So at eventide, just as the stars were blossoming forth, a certain youth stole away from the teepee and entered the deep forest, constantly keeping his ear tuned for the voice of the spirit god in the treetops. He heard nothing, and felt in his breast no response to a spirit call. He heard the song of the brook and still there was no response. He watched the eagle, and the wolf, and the coyote still no response. Day after day he wandered in search of the totem of the spirit god.

He climbed the timbered slopes of Mt. Mazama, and as he did so, he felt an urge within his breast. A series of voices called from the distance. He was drawn toward the mountain top, where he beheld the majesty of blue waters hundreds of feet below him. He heard voices, urging him down to the water's edge. He scaled his agile body down the jagged lava cliffs, where he noticed the spirit fish called "Liao" in the water. The Great Spirit told him if he bathed in the water of the lake he would become endowed with supreme power, but he was warned against injuring "Liao," lest the wrath of the Father would be upon him.

The youth ventured a dip in the icy waters, and became the greatest living being in existence. He climbed dangerous cliffs, slew wild animals, and was all-powerful.

But vanity overcame him. He listened to the voice of self-pride, and one day maliciously threw a spear into a spirit fish. Immediately the Father loosed his wrath, and a great storm arose, lashing waves against the lake walls, and turning the blue of the water to a blood red. The youth was hurled into the churning waters and drowned.

It was then that Chief Multnomah issued a mandate saying that all would die who thereafter gazed upon Crater lake with hate or pride sheltered within their hearts. But those who harbored a feeling of love when they beheld the magic blue would be endowed with the good will of the Great Spirit, and should depart from the lake in glory and honor.

# UNIVERSITY HEADS SCOFF AT CHARGE STATERS TRAPPED

EUGENE, Oct. 28.—(AP)—University of Oregon officials declared Wednesday that every possible effort was made by the university's faculty and students to avert rioting which occurred in Eugene Monday when 2000 Oregon State college students invaded the campus here in a "victory parade." They scoffed at charges in the Oregon State Barometer that the paraders were trapped and mistreated.

According to Virgil D. Earl, dean of men at the university, no official warning was given of the "invasion" by Oregon State officials, and when it was learned from Junction City of the mob headed this way as many students as could be reached in half an hour were urged to give the Staters a friendly, good-natured welcome. The Oregon band was even out to play the Oregon State school song by way of greeting.

No disorder of any kind occurred, Earl said, until a lad on one of the Staters' autos started tossing ears of shelled corn at assembled university students. Troubles started immediately after that, however, and spread like wildfire.

Oregon officials cited many instances of charity for the invaders. Many ducked in the millrace were provided with dry clothing. Fraternities and sororities here fed scores of State students at lunch.

University officials and student leaders are insisting that all Oregon students keep out of Corvallis and avoid all further arguments.

# TWO DIE IN COLLAPSE FRUIT FIRM BUILDING

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Two persons—a man and a woman—were killed today and 15 others injured in the collapse of the second floor of the three-story brick Morris Fruit company building. The victims were Max Zelikson, 32, a salesman, and Anna Olson, another employee.

The dead and injured were buried in a mass of plaster, timbers and fruit and gingerale, which had been stored on the floor that gave way.

Investigations of the disaster were begun immediately.

Robert Short, a member of the fire department arson squad, attributed the crash to overloading.

# BAGLEY CANNERY WILL START SOON ON APPLE CIDER

ASHLAND, Oct. 28.—(Sp.)—The Bagley Canning company here is being put in order for the production of apple juice, which is expected to begin early next week. Cider presses and filters have been taken out of storage and are being overhauled, and several tons of apples have already been received.

Apple juice is not a new product with the cannery, since a considerable quantity was packed several years ago. Present popularity of all fruit juices has revived interest in this line and the company hopes to put up a good sized pack this season, according to Manager Ralph E. Koozer.

An unusually short tomato season was ended October 15. Adverse weather conditions retarded the crop and the pack was only about 38,000 cases of canned tomatoes and tomato juice, slightly more than half the amount packed last year.

A considerable quantity of the total sea, juice, and additional equipment was added for its production, considerably speeding up capacity.

Approximately 1600 tons of tomatoes were used, which brought an average price of \$11.87 per ton to the growers for No. 1's and No. 2's, on the U. S. government grading basis.

The pack was distributed almost entirely on the Pacific coast, including northern California, Oregon and Washington, although a small shipment was made to Cairo, Egypt, which may result in some good export distribution in future years.

SALEM, Oct. 28.—(AP)—The state's irreducible school fund had \$9,203,007 in assets on October 1, most of the assets being in state-owned lands, the state land board reported today. Of this amount, \$9,584,806 was credited to common schools, \$206,800 to Oregon State college, and \$111,321 to the University of Oregon. The reducible fund amounted to \$60,623.
