

LOGSDON SENTENCED TO TWO YEAR TERM FOR THEFT OF AUTO

prison by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton this morning.
Testimony showed Logsdon, Crater Lake park road worker, had permission of the auto owner, a fellow worker, to drive the car to Fort Klammath. From that point, it was testified, with the wife of another fellow worker, Logsdon drove the auto to this section. While parked along the Pacific highway, seven miles from Grants Pass, a four-car collision resulted in which Mrs. N. H. Atchison of Portland, was mortally hurt. The woman, found in the parked auto was sentenced to the county jail on a public intoxication charge.
The court, in passing sentence, declared: "Your conduct in leaving with another man's wife was reprehensible and the only circumstance in your favor is you were too drunk to have any intent."
The court told Logsdon: "You have an irresponsibility bordering on the criminal, and a genius for getting into trouble. You will always be in trouble as long as you indulge in liquor."
The state introduced evidence showing that during prohibition days Logsdon had been involved as an accessory in the theft of alcohol from a Los Angeles warehouse. Logsdon declared he had never been brought to trial on the charge and was not a California fugitive.

Proceeds from the evening's entertainment will go towards the support of the school soup kitchen and a large turnout is hoped for.

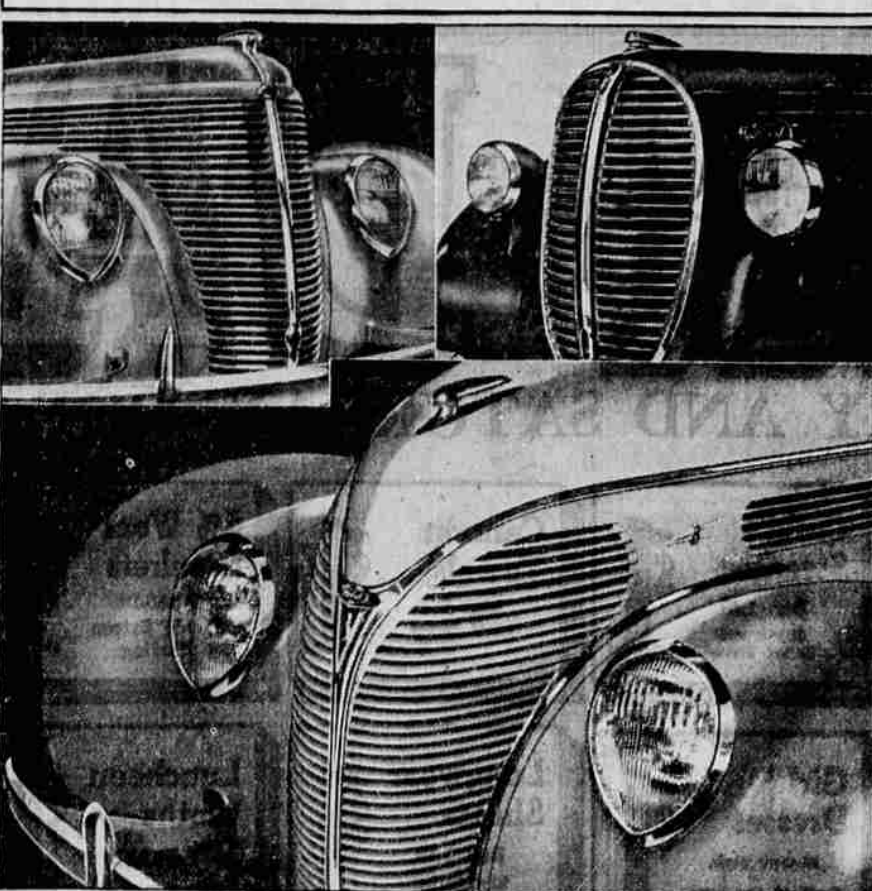
Barbara Stanwyck Delights Audience In "Stella Dallas"

Movie fans who were drawn to the Christian theater yesterday by the announcement of "Stella Dallas" opening its local run, came away thoroughly satisfied that they had seen the most compelling motion picture production since the silent version of the same picture rocketed Belle Bennett to sensational success 12 years ago.
The poignant story of the tawdry, vulgar woman who rises to magnificent heights through her sublime love for her daughter was interpreted by Barbara Stanwyck and a stellar cast with a realism that was breathtaking in its intensity.
Barbara Stanwyck in the title role gives a performance that will undoubtedly be hailed as one of the finest of the year and, as has already been predicted by reviewers all over the country, will probably win for her the coveted Academy Award. This picture should mean the beginning of a new Stanwyck for it is here that we have been given for the first time an insight into the capabilities of this charming star, until now seen only in roles of lighter type.
The story of Stella Dallas is one well known to most followers of the cinema. It depicts the life of Stella, a beautiful, love-starved mill girl who, after a brief romance, marries Stephen Dallas, outside her social sphere. Although she soon discovers they are definitely mismatched, their baby finds an understanding heart expressed in Stella's love for her daughter, seemingly the only redeeming quality of an otherwise coarse manner.
Later, when the girl is humiliated by her mother's vulgar behavior, Stella gets an inkling of the drawback she is to her daughter's future happiness. She decides to give Stephen a divorce so that he may, in turn, marry an old sweetheart and Laurel can have the advantages of a refined home. How she finally turns her child from her and hides the love for her that is tearing at her heart is one of the most deeply moving situations to ever be filmed.
Although Barbara Stanwyck's portrayal of the mother stands out above all others in the cast, one must, however, mention the fine work done by Anne Shirley in the role of the daughter, and also Alan Hale's doting father, Ed Mann, whose whooping flirtation with Stella leads to the breakup of the Dallas home.

Clear Tomato Soup
Roast Lamb
Buttered Broccoli

Currant Jelly
Salsd Greenland
Dutch Apple Cake
Whipped Cream

Salad Greenland
1 tablespoon granulated gelatin
2 tablespoons cold water
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup whipped cream
1 cup cooked asparagus
1-3 cup sliced radishes
1/2 cup chopped sweet pickles
2 tablespoons minced celery
2 tablespoons minced onions
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
Soak gelatin for 5 minutes in water. Dissolve over boiling water. Cool and add to the rest of the ingredients, combined. Let freeze 4 hours (or longer) in tray in mechanical refrigerator. Unmold on lettuce and top with more dressing.
This salad may also be frozen by packing it in a mold, sealing it tightly and burying it for five hours in five parts of chopped ice and one part of coarse salt.
Dutch Apple Cake
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons fat
2-3 cup milk
Mix dry ingredients. Cut in fat and add slowly milk. When a soft dough

- forms, place it on a greased shallow pan and pat down until it is about two-thirds of an inch thick. Spread with topping.
Topping
2 cups sliced apples
3 tablespoons butter
1 cup dark brown sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon cloves
Places the apple slices in even rows on top of the dough. Spread with rest of the ingredients, combined. Bake 20 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve warm or cold with cream, lemon or hard sauce.

Mix ingredients and pour into two greased loaf pans. Let rise for 15 minutes and bake for one hour in a moderately slow oven. Cool and serve made into sandwiches or merely sliced and served with butter.
