

Bend's Lava Bears Invade Medford Tiger Den at 8 o'Clock Tonight

BOWERMAN'S BOYS WILL 'OPEN BOOK' IN TOUGHEST TEST

Locals Pointed to Halt Unbroken Victory March of Bend Squad—Result Will Have Attention of State

Under the archlights of the stadium tonight, Bend high school's mighty Lava Bears and the Black Tornado of Medford high answer the bell in one of the year's classic of classics. Kickoff time is eight o'clock sharp.

Over 5000 spectators are expected to pack the huge, covered grandstand, the temporary bleachers, and the sidelines as Coach Bill Bowerman reveals his new and fighting Tigers in action against the football machine undefeated in 21 consecutive trips to the post.

The football eye of Oregon will be centered on Medford tonight. Already the drums of battle are booming Coach John Londahl's Bend aggregation as the state's "top hole" grid array; the logical choice for that Thanksgiving day battle in Portland against the metropolitan champion. A victory over Medford will leave only Klamath Falls standing in the pathway of a second straight unbeaten year, and will practically clinch the Portland bid for the Lava Bears. A defeat for Bend, and the Portland will look elsewhere for its "championship game" opponent.

In the last game played between the two schools, in 1934, Medford turned on the heat to win going away, 27-0. This season, even the most loyal and rabid Tiger enthusiast can't see a repetition of that encounter. In fact, Tornado backers are having a difficult time seeing a Tornado win, even by a lone point. What betting is going on along Main street, which is not much, has established the Lava Bears six-point favorites.

Tornado Revitalized
Two-time losers so far and deadlocked once, Bowerman's machine is apparently not in the same class with Londahl's brilliant outfit, which has run roughshod over Oregon's finest for more than two years. How-

ever, those who witnessed the Tornado in its savage scorches with Klamath Falls last week, realize that it will be a brand new team out there tonight, a hard-tackling, excellently-conditioned, rock 'em and sock 'em team determined to at last roar into high after a rather disappointing season to date.

Head Man Bowerman stated last night his team was entirely ready for its acid test, its toughest encounter of the year. He has given the Tornado almost a full week's rest to recuperate from the Klamath battle, and announced that every regular was in top condition.

Will Open Book
"We will open the book," he said, when queried as to the offensive tactics Bend can expect.

By opening the book, Medford will attempt to spring sensational Bobby Eitinger into the clear for a climax run or two and produce touchdown passes from Eidon Grow to either Bob Wilson or Don Monteith or any of the lightning-fast backs. Grow found himself in the Klamath game, not only as a line-plunging fullback, but as a forward passer, as well. He will pitch plenty tonight. So will Jack Bowman when he is in there. And, maybe even Eitinger, who shoots them like bullets for short distances. Upon the shoulders of Medford's seven linemen is placed directly the task of halting a Bend attack that hasn't been halted all year. Walt Lidstrom, considered the greatest high school end in the state, features the Lava Bear attack with his slashing end-around gallops which usually finish over the goal line. He has scored seven touchdowns this season. Fullback Redden leads the Bend backfield, exploding through holes in the line with monotonous regularity. Bend's vicious attack is developed from both a balanced and unbalanced line and a single and double wingback backfield formation.

Bears Average 157
Reports from Bend state the Lava Bears average 157 pounds per player, extremely light for a high school machine. However, Medford scouts report the eastern Oregonians look considerably heavier. Medford, with an average weight of about 178, will undoubtedly be the heavier team on the field.

Word from Bend today revealed the team would arrive in Medford about noon, coming in a special stage. The Bend high girls' pep club and drum corps will also make the trip to Medford, 25 strong, and about 100 fans were expected to accompany their team.

BITTER ENEMIES DUE TO COLLIDE AT HOMECOMING

SONS Gunning for First Win Saturday in Three Years of Competition With Monmouth Gridiron Invaders

Years of intense and bitter football rivalry will make its 1937 explosion Saturday afternoon at Ashland when Southern Oregon Normal's SONS face the Wolves of Oregon Normal in the feature attraction of homecoming. Kickoff is at two o'clock sharp.

Defeated twice and tied once in three starts, Coach Jean Eberhart's SONS machine will be gunning for its first win over Monmouth in three years. Comparative scores and past performances this year make the Wolves of Coach Al Cox odds-on favorites to repeat their 6-0 conquest of the SONS last season. Monmouth is undefeated this year, and held the powerful Oregon frosh and Oregon State Rooks to 6-6 ties.

Sons Rested
With an open date last Saturday following their 21-0 defeat at the hands of the Oregon yearlings October 16, the SONS are fully rested and in excellent condition for their big test of the year. Coach Eberhart has developed a surprise offense for the Wolves, which will be used for the first time tomorrow. Southern Oregon fans expect one of the most sensational in a long list of sensational games between the two schools.

SONS lineup will be little changed from that which has opened all three battles so far this season. Jack Hudson, flashy ball-carrier, will be shifted from full to right half, and Al Simpson will take over his old fullback position. At the other halfback post will be Co-Captain Al Eaststrom, fastest man on the squad. Ray Nelson, blocker par excellent, will take care of the quarterback duties.

In the line, Alfred Flap will open at center, Butler, Brace and Sandburg will alternate at the guards, Johnson and Carey will be at the tackles, and Walt Sether and Co-Captain Ken Schilling will take care of the flank posts.

Flashy Attacks Due
Both teams are almost certain to open up with their most gaudy attack, both on the ground and in the air. The SONS will be outwheeled considerably by the visitors, but expect to offset the disadvantage by turning on plenty of burning speed.

Starting lineup for the powerful Wolves will probably be Jake Miller, center; Buck Cagle and George Sudens, guards; Dave Saleeby and Ted Walberg, tackles; and Roy Kadow and Glenn Peterson, ends. In the backfield, Ken Lundy will open at quarter, Dave Howard and Anthol Riney at the halfbacks, and Floyd McClinton, 200-pound line-smasher, at fullback.

Roosevelt Gridders
Coach Linn Mills' Roosevelt football team clinched the Medford grammar school championship yesterday at VanScoyoc field by defeating Washington, 21-0. It was Roosevelt's fifth straight win to no defeats.

In their march through all local opposition, the Roosevelt gridders have piled up a total of 106 points to their opponents' 0. Their narrow squeak was a 7-0 victory over Washington earlier in the season.
