Flood Halts Fight On Aragon Front
ZARAGOZA, Spain, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Insurgent and government armies on the broad Aragon front quit fighting each other today to combat a common enemy—a flood that swamped wide areas in the valleys of the Ebro river and its tributaries. The Gallego river, rushing down from the French frontier to join the Ebro at this insurgent base and old Aragon capital, was at its highest level in 20 years—21 feet above normal. Heavy rains were responsible for the high water.

RADIO TELEPHONE ADDS TO SAFETY OF LAKE VESSELS

LORAIN, Ohio (UP)—Shipping men say it won't be long until sailors aboard Great lakes vessels can chat nightly with their wives and sweethearts by radio telephone. Fifty-seven lake boats now use a ship-to-shore telephone service. Indications are that the system will be extended. Two-way ship-to-shore communication will be the principal subject of a federal communications commission survey. Congress has provided \$20,000 for the study, to be directed by Col. Thad Brown. The investigators will study several phases of lake shipping, but plan to concentrate on the use of radio to insure safety. Proponents of compulsory use of the radio telephone argue that it can be more extensive on the Great lakes than elsewhere. Only one lake, Erie, has radio in use on the lakes, while on the high seas an international telegraph code is necessary to surmount the difficulties caused by the multitude of tongues. One of the objects of the inquiry will be a study of available frequency bands for use of the ship-to-shore communications system. Current charges for a message of this type is 75 cents. Once transmitted to the nearest land station the message moves on by telephone at regular long-distance rates. Ship masters are enthusiastic about the use of the radio telephone on lake vessels. It has been credited with saving lives in more than one instance. A frequently related story is that of the physician who telephoned instructions on the treatment of a sick man to the captain of a ship 400 miles away. Capt. Theodore A. Johnson, of the steamer J. S. Ashley, in upper Lake Michigan, listening to the doctor's voice as it came in over the vessel's radio receiver, made notes of the advice he got. The patient improved, but after showing betterment took a turn for the worse. The nearest hospital was 30 miles away. The vessel put about at once and made for land, calling to a shore station to instruct hospital authorities to have a boat ready to take the ailing man ashore. A small boat with a doctor aboard met the ship and carried the patient to a hospital. Both Canadian and United States shore stations are being established. Seven new Canadian stations are nearing completion. Permits for the construction of two others, one at Port Washington, Wis., and one near Duluth, Minn., have been asked by the Lorain Radio corporation.

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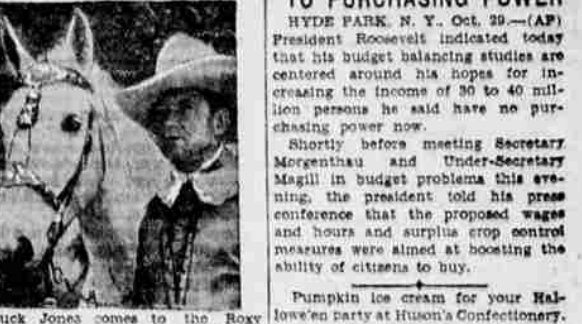
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Jones At Roxy

KENMORE, N. Y.—(UP)—Three-year-old Harry W. Rettke, Jr., of Kenmore may be a child prodigy but "he's not going to be spoiled." The child's mother, Mrs. Harry Rettke, explained that Harry, Jr., is as large, as tall and as mentally developed as the average child of 6.
