

TIMOTHY'S BODY FOUND FLOATING IN ROGUE RIVER

was no reward being offered. Private Funeral.
 Timothy's remains are at the Conger funeral parlors. Services will be held tomorrow, but will be strictly private, only the immediate relatives and friends attending. The Rev. E. S. Bartlam will be in charge. E. S. Bartlam will be in charge. Timothy will be buried beside his wife, who died the night of Oct. 21 from paralysis, caused by the shock of her husband's disappearance. They had lived together 53 years, and it was because of brooding over the condition of his invalid wife that Timothy, himself extremely feeble and unwell, took his own life, it is believed.
 Led by the county sheriff's office, an intensive search had been carried on since late in the afternoon of October 16 when Timothy was last

seen walking feebly toward Hogue river after disembarking from a stage in Gold Hill.
 Letter Told Intent.
 Before getting on the stage in Medford, Timothy had left a letter to his step-daughter, Mrs. Bel F. Richardson. The note said: "Bel, I can't stand to see her suffer, so I am going for a long walk and may not get back."
 The message was discovered by Miss Lottie Watkins at 1105 West Main street, home of Mr. and Mrs. Timothy since last September 24. Miss Watkins was their nurse.
 Authorities were certain that all attempts to recover his body proved futile.
 With his wife, Timothy came to Medford in 1910 from Clinton, Iowa, where they had been married in 1884. For a number of years he was employed by the Southern Pacific railroad in the local baggage department. In 1917, he joined the Medford police force as a patrolman and was promoted to chief in 1918. He served in that capacity until 1923 during which time he made hundreds of friends in the city. Following his police career, Timothy worked at odd jobs here and there, spending some time in the fruit. In later years he became ill with heart trouble and was unable to do much work. He was confined to a local hospital for seven months previous to moving, with his wife, into their home at 1105 West Main street.
 Was 57 Years Old.
 He was born in Clinton Grove, Ill., on May 9, 1880, and was 57 years old. He was born and was in his union with Mrs. Timothy, Iowa, who is his sole survivor. With her husband, Mrs. Kreim visited the aged couple during September and helped them get settled in their new home, Mrs. Bel F. Richardson of Medford, Mrs. Timothy's daughter by a previous marriage, is the only step-child residing nearby. One step-son and one step-daughter live in the middle west.
 The Shoemaker brothers who helped discover Timothy's body are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Shoemaker of Gold Hill. Floyd Boyer is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Boyer of Gold Hill.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 29.—(AP)—West lumber industry is for continued slow markets, the West Coast Lumbermen's association said today.
 Production over a number of weeks has been higher than the volume of orders due to accumulated business in the unfilled order files. As the accumulations are shipped out, the association said, rapid reductions in cutting are anticipated.
 The volume of orders of 71,134,703 board feet reported to the association by 177 Oregon and Washington for the week ending October 23 is the lowest total for a full week since the 1935 lumber strike.
