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Special Services Planned Observe Girl Scout Week

Girl Scout week will be observed in Medford, October 31-November 6, beginning today with the commemoration of the birthday of Juliette Low, who introduced the scout movement in America. Each Girl Scout is to attend her church and special services in honor of Mrs. Low will be given.

Each day of this week there will be special programs, community projects, radio talks, entertainments and special window displays sponsored by the scouts.

Scouts from the large patrol of troop 2 will have a handicraft display at Jacque Lenox's; troop 5 a rock finder exhibit in Kidd's shoe store window; troop 8 a wild flower project at the M. M. store; troop 11 a first aid demonstration at Weeks & Co. Posters used in these displays were made by members of the senior high art class.

The following personal account of girl scouting and Mrs. Low comprises the gist of the special Girl Scout church observances to be heard this morning:

In 1911 an American woman who lived in England met an Englishman and his sister, and as a result of that meeting hundreds of thousands of American girls have learned the satisfactions and delights of outdoor activities. The woman was Mrs. Juliette Gordon Low of Savannah, Ga., and the English couple were Sir Robert Baden-Powell and his sister. They introduced Mrs. Low to the newly formed Girl Guide troops of England, and she enthusiastically transplanted the movement to America, and dedicated herself to the task of making it flourish in its new soil.

She started the first American troops in Savannah, her home city in 1912 and called them Girl Guides, like their English sisters. But the girls, steeped in American traditions, soon asked that the name be changed to Girl Scouts. A year after the first troop was established, Mrs. Low threw all her energies into developing the movement into one of national scope. She bullied and cajoled her friends, newspaper men, equipment manufacturers, girls, young women, and others, who could assist the young organization. Her vision of the human possibilities of the movement and her own energy and charm were so compelling that the Girl Scouts grew not only rapidly, but strongly. Pled by the fine qualities of the idea itself, and by Mrs. Low's own enthusiasm and example, women all over the country began training themselves for leadership in the steadily forming Girl Scout troops.

Mrs. Low dashed from conference to conference, from city to city, from America to England, carrying with her always her dream of an international Girl Scout movement, and her determination that fine women everywhere should take part in it. In all the confusion of plans and organization, however, she never lost sight of her ideal, that Girl Scouting should be a movement which gave girls the advantages of outdoor life and interests, and of character developed through contact and cooperation with other girls.

Mrs. Low's dream of an international Girl Scout council was realized in 1919. The council was formed, with representatives from 32 countries. In 1926 the Girl Scouts of the United States were hostesses at a World Camp, at which delegates from all the countries were present. This was Mrs. Low's dearest hope, and it was almost a personal tribute to her that it was accomplished, as the difficulties seemed insuperable. Two entire camps were built for the occasion in Briarcliff Manor, New York and both the camps and the encampment were tremendously successful.

The World Camp came none too soon. In 1927 Mrs. Low died, gallant and charming to the last, of an affliction which she had suffered for many years. With her girls of the United States lost one of their most devoted champions.

Juliette Low's career is not only an ideal for the Girl Scouts to revere and emulate, it is one which should inspire all women. The fact that a woman of 61, handicapped by illness and deafness, could still visualize, establish and guide a movement of such magnitude as the Girl Scouts, should be a lesson to the world.

This year the Girl Scouts celebrate their 25th birthday. Again they will entertain a World Camp and they wish that Juliette Low were here to see how finely and vitally the organization has grown. But they are happy in the knowledge that they are still working toward her ideal, the highest possible human ideal, of healthy, interested youth, and international trust.
