PICK LAVA BEARS TO COP TITLE IN STATE GRID RACE

Bend, Oregon City and Tillamook Are Only Undepleted Teams—Klamath, Bend Meet Armistice Day

The Bend Lava Bears held the No. 1 position in interscholastic football today and saw a broad, safe trail ahead for the Oregon mythical championship.

The season moved past brisk October week-ends into quiet November, leaving only Bend, the Oregon City Pioneers, and the Tillamook Cheesemakers undefeated and untied. Salem has neither a loss nor a tie in its Oregon schedule but an early season upsetting by Camas, Wash., made it second choice to the unblemished schools of central Oregon, the Willamette valley and the coast country.

Bend's impressive touchdown parade over powerful opponents represents both the east and west sides of the Cascades made it a better looking title prospect than either Tillamook or Oregon City. The happy combination of speed and power gave the Bears an easy 32 to 7 triumph over Medford. It was Medford's most decisive trimming in years and the Bears are generally contenders.

Coach Johnny Londahl's Bend youths still have to settle the yearly argument with the Klamath Falls Pelicans. Klamath's football prospects bounced back Saturday with a 19 to 13 victory over Pendleton. Comparative scores against the same opponents, however, give the Bears a wide margin.

Gridiron Picture Given New Light By Week's Games

Big, significant things happened in the football theater the past week-end. Here in Medford, it was proved beyond doubt that the 1937 Tigers are somewhat below the usual form displayed by Black Toronado aggregations. Admitting that Bend was one of the greatest high school teams ever seen here, the fact still remains—Coach Bowerman's team is not in the same class with the finest from Oregon's other sections.

On the other hand, wiping away some of the bitterness of that 32-7 defeat was the brilliant performance of Medford's "flaming sophomores," injected into the fray when all was hopelessly lost. Especially, Red Stead, Bob Newland and Eugene Miller, the first two backs, and the latter a fine end. It was Stead, a fighting, half-pint quarterback, who scored Medford's lone touchdown on a gambling lateral pass from Miller, after the end had received a forward toss from Shorty Campbell. Incessant sophomores were not afraid to take chances; they were in there lining for touchdowns, and they got one. Newland revealed he could pass a football. Although inexperienced he is undoubtedly the best passer on the squad, and needs only a little more game action to develop into a fine gunner for an aerial attack. He is still rather wild with his passes.

In the Southern Oregon conference, this past week-end indicated the return to a place in the championship picture of Grants Pass, which surprisingly handed the favored Ashland Grizzlies a 13-6 defeat. Mathematically out of the pennant scramble, the Cavemen can still upset the applicant of Medford, their lone remaining league encounter. The win over Ashland Friday was a Kings K affair, only the first meeting between the two teams counting in the standings. Ashland won that, 12-0, but suffered a loss of prestige in Friday's battle if not an actual setback in the championship race.

Overconfidence undoubtedly was a factor in the Grizzlies' setback Friday. Coach Skeet O'Connell admitted as much. However, he also stated that Grants Pass played real football. So Medford, which can win the title only by defeating Ashland and Grants Pass, had better not consider the latter game in the bag, which it appeared to be until the uprising Friday.

On the Pacific coast, California's Golden Bears continued their march toward the Rose Bowl with a 21-14 victory over their little cousins, the UCLANS. With only Oregon, Washington and Stanford remaining in their path, it becomes apparent that only a miracle can keep Stub Allison's team from the championship. Neither Oregon nor Stanford appears to have what it takes to produce the miracle. For that matter, neither does Washington. But the game in Seattle, which may or may not mean anything. It's the only chance, obviously, to halt the 1937 "wonder team."
