STAR GAZES AT AMERICA WHEN ANNA NEAGLE BRITISH MOVIE ACTRESS ARRIVES IN OREGON

Corbin Edgell, a resident of the valley for 26 years, during which time he had been continuously engaged in the orchard business, passed away suddenly in his sleep early Monday morning, November 1, at his ranch residence a few miles south of the city.

Mr. Edgell had been feeling a trifle below par the past week, and had consulted a doctor, but had not been actually ill, nor was his condition regarded as serious in any way. In fact, he had felt so much improved Sunday that he and Mrs. Edgell had accepted an invitation to dine with friends, and appeared to be in perfectly normal health throughout the evening. The following morning, however, when he did not answer a call, an investigation revealed that some time during the night death had come.

Corbin Edgell was born in St. Louis, Missouri, November 21, 1882, the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Edgell, the family moving to Mrs. Edgell's home in New York city when he was two years old. Prepared for Harvard first at Pomfret and later at Phillips Academy, Andover, Massachusetts, he entered Harvard in the class of 1902, and after graduation completed a law course at New York university, graduating there with honors. He was admitted to the New York bar, but practiced only a short time, joining with his uncle, Austin Corbin, in the purchase of pear orchards near Eagle Point, which he owned and operated up to the time of his death.

Mr. Edgell was a charter member of the Rogue River Valley University club, the Medford Golf club, the Elks, and had retained his long-time membership in the Harvard club and the University club of New York city.

On November 30, 1921, Mr. Edgell married Ruth Holloway, daughter of Mrs. Alice Lee Holloway of Medford, who with his younger brother, George Harold Edgell, former dean of the Harvard Architectural school and present director of the Boston Museum, survive him.
