

Pioneer Applegate Miner Observes 88th Birthday

BIG APPLEGATE, Nov. 4.—(Sp.)—Looking back over long years of service both as a miner and carpenter was the privilege of Newton Haskins Tuesday, when he observed his 88th birthday. Mr. Haskins, who resides here with his son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Haskins, was honored with a dinner in the evening, to which a number of local friends were invited. Sharing honors in this event was a very young guest, Charles Culy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Culy, whose birthday occurred early this month.

This pioneer enjoys his violin and the radio, even though he can no longer see to engage in other kinds of recreation. He likes the outdoors, and despite his years, never has lost his enthusiasm for going places; occasionally he attends some community function, and last summer accompanied his son on prospecting trips to familiar haunts in the Siskiyou. Mr. Haskins attended annual pioneer meeting in Ashland last month, where he was honored as the only survivor of the original pioneer society.

This aged man has experienced the romance of early mining days in southern Oregon. He worked as a hydraulic engineer, and among the mines with which he was associated are Cameron and Ennis mine on Calice creek, Grand Applegate mine, Pennsylvania mine, Dividend Bar, and Maynetta Bee mine on Klamath river. In 1877 he was employed as foreman under Captain Ankeny at the Sterling mine, and for seven years was foreman over 87 Chinese miners.

The Siskiyou mountains and the adjoining Applegate hills where he wandered in his younger days, are endeared to the heart of this man. Even at the present when he rides over modern roads through the mountains, he possesses a keen sense of location, and is able to tell the "lay of the country" at almost any point. On one exploration trip to Donamore with Alonzo Sturgis in 1888 Mr. Haskins was gone two months. Provisions were exhausted, and clothing was worn threadbare. It was on this trip that Mr. Haskins moulded nails from an iron skillet (which he had made in his father's blacksmith shop at Uniontown) and replaced a loosened horseshoe.

He has built many barns, houses, and mines' buildings in the Applegate section. Thirty-two years ago he built the covered bridge at Beaver creek, which was removed last fall.

Mr. Haskins' first school was at Kerby, and later he attended at Williams, Jacksonville and Uniontown. In 1877 he married Ardie Sams, whose death occurred 21 years ago.

Since his arrival near Roseburg in 1854 at the age of five, Mr. Haskins has spent 81 years in the west. Six years ago he returned to his native state of Illinois, residing there two years. While in that state, he visited Galesburg, where he was born, finding the crossroads village of his memory much changed in the intervening years.

His first trip across the plains took five months, and the caravan was composed of 45 wagons. Following
