

EARLY ACTION IN ROBBERY CASE IS PLAN OF NEWMAN

District Attorney Says Accused Football Players to Decide Today Whether to Wait Grand Jury Action

Early action in the cases of Bill Cagle, 23, Marshall Hearn, 20, and Stanley Borden, 19, Oregon Normal school at Monmouth football squad members, charged with assault and robbery upon E. D. Rice, Dallas, Tex., traveling jewelry salesman, was planned today by District Attorney F. J. Newman. The district attorney said the trio were expected to make a decision today whether or not they desired to go direct into circuit court or wait grand jury action. If the

later course was decided upon by the accused, the grand jury would be called immediately, Newman said.

Richard M. Messenger, 22, Ashland drug store clerk, at liberty on \$2000 bonds furnished by his father and his employer, has decided, through counsel, to await grand jury action. The father of Stanley Borden of Olympia, Wash., was due to arrive today to consult with his son and arrange for legal help.

Rice, purported robbery victim, following an interview yesterday with authorities, promised to remain here as a material witness, following issuance of a statement. Authorities said interviews with the three football players and Rice indicated the alleged assault and robbery was "due to a sudden impulse, and not premeditated." A number of Ashland residents who saw Rice and the four youths leave the cafe Saturday night in the Messenger car, were queried by the district attorney.

Cagle, the district attorney reported, in his statement declared he had been employed by the state highway commission last summer and planned matrimony following receipt of his teacher's certificate. Cagle, whose home is in North Carolina, further stated he was a member of the O.S.C. football squad during the last spring

practice, and sustained an ankle injury.

Cagle's statement also declared he had played football since he was 17 years old, and after graduation had been a gridiron prospect at the Florida Military Institute, University of California at Los Angeles, besides O.S.C. and Oregon Normal.

Diamond Models Form Display In Mann's Window

An interesting exhibit is on display this week in one of the show windows of Mann's Department store. It is a magnificent collection of 13 exact models of the world's most famous diamonds, including those which rank as the largest and most historically noted.

The largest diamond in the collection, the Grand Mogul, weighs 279 carats, and the collective value of the originals is placed at about \$8,200,000.

The collection includes the famous Florentine, a 239 1/2-carat stone of lustrous beauty, with soft pink and yellow casts sparkling forth from many facets; the Orlov of 184 1/2 carats, so perfect a replica of the original that it carries the rather deep crack in its facets that is so visible to the naked eye in the original. Other famous diamonds represented in this collection are the Pigot, the Polar Star, the Pascha of Egypt, the Shah of Persia, the Nassak, the Leitchberg, the Sancy, the regent of Pitt, the Star of the South, the Jubilee diamond, "Excelsior," of an original weight of 971 carats, and the Jehan Ghir Shah.

The imitations are faithful reproductions of the originals in true adherence to shape, cuttings and fire. They have proved of tremendous interest to gem lovers and students of history, being associated with the rise and fall of empires—nor is their appeal confined to these groups alone, for every lover of beauty, child or adult, is fascinated by the display.

1 cup navy beans
8 cups water
Ham bone
1/4 cup chopped onions
1/4 cup chopped celery
1/4 cup chopped carrots
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
2 cups boiling water
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
Wash beans. Add water and allow to soak for two hours of longer. Add bone, celery, onions, carrots and parsley. Cook and simmer for three hours. Add boiling water and salt and pepper. Let simmer 30 minutes. Remove the ham bone and serve the soup.
Cabbage Salad with Sour Cream Dressing
2 cups shredded cabbage
1-3 cup sour cream
1 teaspoon granulated sugar
1 tablespoon vinegar
1-3 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
Mix cream with vinegar and seasonings. Pour over cabbage and serve.
Scrambled Eggs and Sausages
1/2 pound link sausages
8 egg yolks
1-3 cup milk
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon minced onions
1/4 teaspoon minced parsley
3 egg whites, beaten
Cut sausage into one-inch pieces. Place in a hot frying pan. Cook five minutes. Stir several times. Beat yolks and add milk and seasonings. Fold in whites and add mixture to sausages. Cook slowly and stir constantly until thick.

CHINA BRINGS UP FRESH TROOPS IN SHANGHAI DEFENSE

Japanese planes took the air to drop a number of small bombs on the right flank of the Chinese line extending westward from Shanghai.

The Japanese drive suffered a setback, a Chinese spokesman declared, when Chinese artillery destroyed two of three bridges Japanese engineers had thrown over Soochow creek. He added, however, that severe fighting was in progress on the south bank beyond Rubicon village.

There were persistent reports that Chinese were on the verge of withdrawing from the entire Shanghai peninsula, but the reports were without confirmation.

American and foreign observers said the first Japanese objective apparently was the Hungjiao airbase three miles southwest of Rubicon. They stated the Japanese were making only slow progress.

Spirited fighting was under way on all fronts in China, but neither Chinese nor Japanese were able to achieve clear-cut gains toward major objectives. From first hand observation and from communiques of the two factions it appeared that a temporary stalemate had developed.
