OFFICERS OF ALGIC FORMALLY CHARGED WITH MANSLAUGHTER

BALTIMORE, Nov. 4.—(AP)—United States Commissioner James K. Cullen issued warrants today charging two officers of the government-owned freighter Algic with involuntary manslaughter.

He issued the warrants against Second Mate Ernest B. Waters and Third Mate John F. Pike shortly after ordering that 14 striking Algic seamen be held for federal grand jury action on charges of mutiny.

Commissioner Cullen acted upon testimony of several members of the Algic's crew who contended negligence of Waters and Pike contributed to the death of Seaman Howell V. Gill who drowned in Montevideo, Uruguay, attempting to "jump ship."

The Algic sailed again recently for South America, leaving Waters and Pike in Baltimore, Cullen said.

"I do not find the conduct of you men grave in any way," Cullen told the sailors, "but there is evidence of your insubordination. I therefore find, under the law, you subject to the criminal statute for wilful neglect of duty and disobedience of your master's orders."

The seamen went back to jail in default of \$500 bond each. The strike occurred last September 10 in Montevideo.
