KICKOFF SLATED FOR 8 P. M. SHARP ON MEDFORD GRID

Both Teams Boast Stellar Passing Combinations — Rival Coaches Promise Sensational Offensives

In Al Simpson and Al Eselstrom, Coach Jean Eberhart's SONS are fortified with two of the finest pitchers now performing in the state's smaller colleges. Bob Olson, former Medford high star, and Ken ("Rowdy") Dow spark the Orange air attack. Olson acting as long-distance gunner and Dow taking care of the short, sharp tosses.

Sensations Promised.

The rival coaches have both indicated they will spring many new and sensational offensive maneuvers tonight. Wild Bill McKalip, mentor of the baby Beavers, has been drilling his charges all week on a new shovel pass, which is expected to receive a thorough airing for the first time against the SONS. Eberhart admits his ball club will open up with everything in the book, including some skullduggery, in an attempt to stop the Rooks.

Comparative scores against two common opponents reveal only a one-touchdown difference between the teams. Oregon State tied Monmouth, 6-6, while the SONS lost to the same outfit, 0-6. University of Oregon Frosh tripped the SONS, 21-0, and defeated the Rooks, 20-7.
