

BROTHERS FIGURE TRAVEL TO SCHOOL AT 174,960 MILES

CLEVELAND (UP)—Thomas Sebian has returned to Cathedral Latin high school carrying on a "commuting tradition" started and held by the Sebian brothers of Painesville, Ohio, and after much addition and multiplication, he computed the distance the Sebian brothers had traveled to school at 174,960 miles.

George, who now is 28, and the oldest Sebian brother, started the school-going tradition. After George, there followed four more Sebian—Paul, 26; Aloysius, 21; William, 18, and now Thomas, 15.

The Sebian commuted between their home in Painesville to Cathedral Latin—a distance of 27 miles—by train, "thumbing" and by offering through an advertisement, to "dive up" the gasoline bill with a commuting motorist.

Francis Sebian, another brother who comes between Paul and Aloysius with an age of 23, was put out of the commuting when his leg was broken in seven places in a motorcycle accident.

Two more Sebian brothers, Richard, an eighth grader, and John, a fifth grader—expect to follow the others to Cathedral Latin in a few years.

Mary Ann, the family "baby," won't carry on the Sebian brothers' tradition. Cathedral Latin is a boys' school.

Each of his four brothers that preceded him to Cathedral Latin made the 54-mile round trip on 180 school days each year for four years. He multiplied the school days by the mileage.

He then calculated the miles he and his two brothers still in school have traveled. By the same method he also calculated the number of miles they will have to travel before graduation—97,200.

BEAVERS HELPED IN SOUTH DAKOTA

BELLE FOURCHE, S. D. (UP)—Harry Henderson, trapper-warden for the South Dakota state game and fish department, has taken a cue from the federal government and has started rehabilitation projects for the state's beavers.

Henderson removes the dam building animals from property where they are causing damage to remote sections of the Black Hills where he rehabilitates them.

"We give them a chance to start housekeeping all over again," Henderson said. "When a farmer or rancher reports beavers are damaging trees or are insisting on building dams where they should not be, we go out and trap them."

Entire colonies of beavers are trapped before a dam is left. Workers start a new dam in some remote stream. In virtually every instance, Henderson said, the beavers will adjust themselves to their new home and complete the dam the state starts for them.

LONDON (UP)—England, already the home of the world's largest building (the mammoth Earl's Court exhibition building) has under construction what is expected to be the world's largest cathedral, surpassing even St. Peter's in Rome. It is the Roman Catholic Cathedral of Christ the King, at Liverpool. Construction was begun in 1933. It may take a century to complete. By coincidence, it is almost within hailing distance of the unfinished Anglican cathedral, on the same ridge, overlooking the city. The Anglican cathedral, begun in 1904, will be finished in the 1950s.

The Catholic cathedral will cover five acres, more than twice the area of its neighbor, which is the largest Anglican cathedral in England. It will cost more than \$15,000,000, will have an enormous body, and a dome 168 feet in diameter.

By strange chance, the Anglican cathedral is the work of a Catholic architect, Sir Giles Scott, and the Catholic cathedral will be the most impressive work of Sir Edwin Lutyens, a Protestant.

The styles of the two buildings are radically different. The Anglican cathedral will be modern Gothic; Sir Edwin describes the style of the Catholic cathedral as Renaissance. The first will be of red sandstone, the second of brick, of which more than 2,000,000 will be required in addition to thousands of tons of granite and other stone.

Although work on the Catholic cathedral was started four years ago and has progressed steadily, little is to be seen of the building since the work is still underground. Thousands of tons of rock have been hewn out, and the crypt walls are rising toward ground level.

There are two crypt chapels, in one of which, the Chapel of the Seven Dolours, Archbishop Dr. Downey sang the first mass October 31. The other, the Relics chapel, will be equipped with a rolling gate or door made of marble and weighing three tons. It is a disc and will be rolled like a wheel away from the doorway into the chapel, into a slot. A mechanism of counterweights has been devised to operate it at a touch.

CENTURY OF WORK UPON CATHEDRAL FACED IN ENGLAND

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ICE AGE RELICS FOUND BY CHILDREN AT PLAY

HALLE, Germany (AP)—Playing children are getting credit for the discovery of valuable relics of the ice age, including a tusk of a mammoth and the shoulder of a prehistoric rhinoceros, found in the municipal rubbish heap at Camburg, near here.

Two years ago, the skull of a prehistoric ibex was found in a nearby gravel pit. It proved to be an important discovery as it was regarded as the only existing trace of this animal.

It is believed that children playing around the gravel pit before the discovery was made may have unearthed these latest relics and thrown them on the rubbish heap.
