A meeting will be held in K. P. hall at which time a large class of candidates will be initiated in Dr. Mehrmann's honor.

After the ceremony Dr. Mehrmann will address the assemblage. His address will be followed by the district conference over which D. D. Hall, Portland, state organizer, will preside.

After hearing Dr. Mehrmann, the women's auxiliaries, attending the convention will convene at 3 o'clock in the armory. The women will return to the K. P. hall to attend a banquet at 6 o'clock. The day's program will be concluded with a dance in the hall.

Dr. Mehrmann will address the convention on the fraternity's campaign for legislation to help the dependent and the underprivileged, it was announced by Fred Powell, president of Crater Lake aeris.

"In addition to looking after its own members, the Eagles lodge has engaged in social welfare activities for the benefit of all, and now we are backing legislation designed to stabilize employment," Mr. Powell said. "We are stressing this campaign because we believe that our country will be safe from severe economic depressions, with their consequent widespread suffering, only when workers have steady jobs at a saving wage."

MAIL THIEF BEATS POLICE BY SUICIDE

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 5. — (AP) — Nine hours after a government mail truck had been held up, O. Leroy Richardson, 38-year-old drug store employe, took his own life today as authorities recovered \$500 in registered mail from the man's home.

Held as a suspect in the case was Frank E. Chase, 36, whose automobile was identified, Lieut. Ray Bergh of the Los Angeles county sheriff's office said, by Earl R. Irwin, driver of the postal service truck.

Lieutenant Bergh said Richardson shot himself through the heart as he stood outside the office of Attorney Guy Lewis. Richardson was an object of a police search at the time of death.

The holdup took place in south-side Los Angeles last night. Irwin said his truck was forced to the curb by two men in a late model sedan, after he had picked up the registered mail from outlying substations.

INDICT MRS. LEDFORD AS POISON SLAYER OF TWO STEP-DAUGHTERS

ST HELENS, Nov. 5.—(AP)—A Columbia county grand jury indicted Mrs. Agnes Ledford on two first degree murder counts after a three-day investigation of the alleged poison deaths of her step-daughters, Ruth, 13, and Dorothy, 15.

The indictments supported and augmented information charging her with Ruth's death, filed last week by the Columbia county sheriff.

The deaths in September were attributed previously to poison spray from wild blackberries. District attorney David O. Bennett said Mrs. Ledford, held in the Multnomah county jail, probably would plead to the indictments this week.

OREGON UTILITIES UP IN VALUATION

SALEM, Nov. 5.—(AP)—The assessed valuation of Oregon utilities was \$160,417,114 this year, \$4,993,860 more than 1936. The tax commission will use this year's valuations as a basis for next year's taxes.

Valuation of steam railroads increased about \$3,000,000 to \$75,515,013, while electric companies increased about \$2,000,000 to \$53,365,487.

Telephone company valuation to dropped \$300,000 to \$9,355,458, while electric and street railway companies \$127,487, car companies \$1,723,336, and telegraph companies \$1,407,252.
