

1938 BUDGET ESTIMATES—JACKSON COUNTY

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 8, Chapter 446 of the Laws of Oregon, notice is hereby given that the County Court of Jackson County, Oregon, will meet at the Court House in Medford, Oregon, on the 15th day of November A. D. 1937, at the hour of 10:00 o'clock A. M. of said day and at the said time and place opportunity will be given for a full and complete discussion of the estimate of the amount of money proposed to be raised by taxation for the ensuing year as published herewith, by any taxpayer subject to such levy when made in favor of or against any of the proposed tax levies herein as the County Court may desire for the best interest of Jackson County.

The County Budget Committee for Jackson County, Oregon, has prepared and submits the following: An estimate of the amount required for each department of County government, County office and County officer, each County improvement, the maintenance of each County building, structure or institution, the salary of each County officer or employee, including those whose salaries are fixed by statute, for the improvement and maintenance of public highways, roads, bridges, the construction, operation and maintenance of each public utility and redemption of out-standing warrants, the estimate of the public receipts of the County from sources other than direct taxation upon real and personal property in the County during the period for which such tax is to be levied and an estimate of the probable unapportioned and unexpended balance in the funds of the County on the last day of the current year. The officers salaries, the County School Fund for 10,100 children at \$10.50 per child, the County School and School Library Fund for 10,100 children at 10 cents per child and the County Library Fund at .0052 of a mill are all fixed by law.

Cod Fish Plant Is Destroyed By Fire SALISBURY, Calif., Nov. 5. — (AP) — Fire of undetermined origin swept through the codfish reduction plant of the Union Fish company at Belvedere early today, causing damage estimated unofficially at "about \$160,000."

Huge vats of fish oil—about the size of an ordinary five-room house—and 50 gallon drums of oil exploded, spreading flaming liquid over the plant. Seven explosions were heard in rapid succession, followed by lesser detonations. The oil-fed fire was visible for miles.
