### ASK BANKERS SUPPORT FEDERAL REGULATION FOR ELECTRIC POWER

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, W. Va., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Frank R. McNinch, until recently chairman of the federal power commission, appealed to the investment bankers today to support government regulation of the electric power business as a strong underpinning for the market for utility securities.

Addressing the annual convention of the Investing Bankers' Association of America, McNinch recited detailed statistics to show the power business has prospered steadily under government regulation.

The bankers viewed his remarks as made in answer to the charge of the committee of utility executives that \$2,500,000,000 in normal utility construction expenditures had been deferred because of the administration's "fixed punitive policy toward the industry."

McNinch, who recently left the power commission to head the federal communications commission, said the public utility "picture carries much that is encouraging and reassuring, but it should be uncandid did I not also say that, in my judgment, a serious factor having injurious effects upon power securities is the attitude of die-hard opposition on the part of some leaders in the industry to regulatory legislation which has been enacted by congress."

### HISTORICAL SOCIETY CONDUCTING CONTEST FOR ESSAY ON COOK

"The Voyage of Captain James Cook to the Northwest Coast" will be the subject of the 1938 C. C. Beskin essay contest, conducted by the Oregon Historical society and open to any student over 15 and under 18 years of age attending any public or private school, academy, seminary, college, university or other educational institution within the state of Oregon. It has been announced by the committee.

For the best original essay submitted on the subject a cash prize of \$50 will be given. Second prize will be \$20; third, \$10; and fourth, \$5. Each of the four prize winners will also receive a handsome bronze medal.

The essays, which may be handwritten, must not exceed 2000 words in length. With each essay submitted, there must also be a certificate signed by the principal or teacher stating the essay was written by a student attending that institution. All competitive essays will be judged according to their general merit and excellence and will be read by three judges to be selected by the committee.

All essays must be delivered by mail or in person to the Oregon Historical Society, public auditorium, 238 S. W. Market street, Portland, not later than March 16, 1938.

### CCC COMPANY MOVES IN MEDFORD DISTRICT ARE NOW COMPLETED

Company moves in the Medford district have been completed, and the camps are settling down for a winter of work, play and study. Thirty-four companies make up the new district, which on November 1 took over nine camps of the disbanded Redding district.

Camp Digger, near Red Bluff, Calif., which had originally been slated for Medford, has been transferred to the Sacramento district, leaving this district 18 Oregon and 16 California camps.

Seventeen new fourth corps area outfits occupy an even half of the camps in the Medford district, while nine of the camps are occupied by companies from the ninth corps area and eight by eighth corps area companies.

Although the Redding district has been transferred to the Sacramento district, it will continue to be administered by the Redding district office.

### LAST MAN'S CLUB DINES TOMORROW

The Last Man's club will hold its first annual banquet in the Hotel Medford at 8:30 tomorrow night. It was announced today by W. W. Huntley, secretary. I. D. Centfield is president.

The club was organized last June. Enrollment was open for six weeks and the club enlisted 80 members. Enrollment is now closed. Membership was limited to war veterans belonging to four service organizations, the United Spanish War Veterans, American Legion, Disabled American Veterans of the World War and Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Aim of the club is to meet at dinner once a year until only one member survives. At the last banquet the sole survivor is to drink from a bottle of champagne as a toast to his departed comrades and as a mark of the club's end. The bottle of champagne, now in the club's possession, contains a label bearing the names of the members. As each dies a star will be placed before his name.

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### OIL-TAINTED MILK BRINGS SENTENCE

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Superior Judge Frank M. Smith imposed a one to ten-year prison sentence today upon Sidney Jones, former Seattle teamster, convicted of putting croton oil in a can of milk last summer while employed at a strike-affected Los Angeles hotel.

Judge Smith suspended the sentence and placed Jones on five years' probation, however, on the condition that he serve a year in the county jail. He also fined Jones \$500 and ordered him to pay doctor bills of two hotel employes who became ill after eating pudding in which oil-tainted milk was used.

Asking clemency, Jones blamed the "higher ups" for the real responsibility in the case and criticized them for not coming to his aid.
