

AUTOIST SUFFERS LOSS OF EYE IN PLUNGE OFF BANK

Eugene I. Parks, 23, of 9 East Jackson boulevard, suffered the loss of his left eye late Friday night when his car plunged over a 30-foot embankment about one-half mile east of the Hillcrest orchards and rolled over several times. He is confined in Community hospital.

Dr. A. N. Johnson, attending physician, stated that it appeared a twig from a tree had apparently crashed through the windshield and speared Parks' eye. The victim suffered no other head cuts, the doctor said, although he was being closely observed on the possibility he received a skull fracture.

Parks told the physician he failed to make a turn in the freshly graded road, skidded and tumbled over the grade.

According to a city police report of the mishap, Parks had taken some CCC enrollee's to Camp Prescott and was returning when the accident occurred. B. L. Dodge of route 4, returning from town, saw young Parks wandering along the road just east of the Rogue Valley Golf club on Carpenter hill and picked him up and took him to the hospital, police said.

The car, a 1931 Ford coach, was towed into Medford by Ralph Parks, brother of the injured man.

City police report that young Parks also lost a billfold containing about \$40.

The Civic Concert Service is a subsidiary of the National Broadcasting Company and has organized the civic music groups all over the United States in a revival of concert interest.

Jose Iturbi, pianist; Luboahutz and Nemsoff, duo pianists; Continental Ensemble; Rudolph Serkin, pianist; Rose Rumpston, soprano; Helen Gagan, star of stage, screen and radio; Shan Kar, Hindu ballet; Trudi Schoop and her comic ballet; Albert Spalding, violinist; Frank Forest, radio and screen tenor; Kolisch String Quartet; and Rubinof, famous violinist.
