

Greybeal's Run, Nicholson's Kick Gives Oregon Win Over Cougars

CALLISON SQUAD INTERCEPTS PASS TO HALT THREATS

Webfoot Errors Aid Cougars Along With Jitters, But Win Second Conference Victory.

MULTNOMAH STADIUM, Portland, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Oregon settled down from an attack of fourth-quarter jitters to smother a Washington State scoring threat and win its second Pacific coast conference football game today, 10 to 6.

Diminutive Jimmy Nicholson, reserve halfback from Salem, booted over a placement in the third period and established a 10-point lead. Washington State subtracted six points from the handicap, with a final period touchdown and got as far as the Oregon six-yard line two minutes from the end of the contest, which 10,000 fans saw.

Oregon hustled toward its second conference victory with a 50-yard march in the opening period. Jay Graybeal, Pendleton's bouncing jack-rabbit, ate up 23 yards with a dart around right end. Graybeal shifted his attack to the left side of the Washington State line and sped across the goal line on the next play. Joe Huston, guard, place-kicked the extra point.

Arleigh Bentley, Oregon fullback, thundered 26 yards to the Washington State 13-yard line early in the third period to set up the field goal. Nicholson maneuvered the ball into position on the nine-yard line directly in front of the goal and lofted it over from where he stood on the 19. The Cougars menaced the Oregon lead with the help of Webfoot mistakes.

Hal Harrison, Cougar end, blocked Graybeal's punt and curled himself around the ball on the Oregon 18. Paul Callow, reserve back, and Littlefield, full back, smashed the line twice to the 11. Callow went through left tackle for the remaining distance. Halfback Joe Sisko's try for point banged into the goal post and fell back.

Eddie Bayne, halfback, was stopped one foot short of a touchdown for Washington State in the first period. Bayne's crashes, averaging from four to five yards a shot, sent the Cougars to the Oregon seven-yard line a few minutes later. The Webfoots held for down.

Oregon fumbled a lateral and had to stand off a scoring threat deep in the fourth quarter. The Webfoots kicked out to Cougar territory but Callow rushed the ball back into dangerous territory from a lateral. Passes from Callow to Angelo and Harrison put Washington State on the Oregon 18. Oregon smothered a running attack on the six-yard line and Gebhardt, reserve back, wiped out the touchdown menace with an interception.

OLSON RETURN OF PUNT FEATURE OF ROOKS 14-12 WIN

Conversions Of Extra Points Give Edge Over Sons In Friday Night Game.

Striking for two touchdowns in the second quarter and adding the extra point after each, Oregon State's Rook football machine defeated Southern Oregon Normal here Friday night, 14-12, in a spectacular and viciously fought battle.

It was Bob Olson, 173-pound right halfback from Phoenix and last year's Medford high star, who furnished Bill McKelip's baby Beavers with their decisive touchdown. Olson, displaying the same class that last season made him the most talked-of high school player in southern Oregon until intelligently ended his high school career, came through with a blistering 80-yard touchdown run on a punt return to give the Saters a 13-6 lead. Heringer converted with a placekick to make it 14-6, and that was the ball game.

SONS scored first in the opening quarter when Co-Captain Ken Schilling recovered a fumble on the Rook 21-yard line. Jack Hudson, Al Kowalski and Ray Nelson took turns in plunging to the two-yard line where Nelson, on a quarterback sneak, went over center for the touchdown. Younce, big Rook left tackle, blocked Simpson's attempted dropkick for the extra point.

The huge Orange team recovered a fumbled lateral pass on the SONS 32-yard stripe early in the second quarter and moved to the 10-yard line. A steady drive culminated in the brilliant Joe Tomich, quarterback, cutting over center from 10 yards out and crossing the goal line. Tomich then plunged through the SONS line for the extra point, making it 7-6.

It was only a few moments later that Olson, catching Pullback Al Simpson's long punt on the Rook 20-yard line, sewed up the ball game. The ex-Medford flash cut to the sidelines, then reversed his field and booted straight down the middle, shaking off at least four SONS tacklers and dodging and pivoting like a Red Grange. Once in the clear he outran the SONS to the goal line.

Opening up with a brilliant forward passing attack, the Ashlanders got their second touchdown in the third quarter. After several shots from Simpson to Walt Sether, and Schilling, Simpson lined a sharp toss to Hudson in the Rook right flat and Hudson raced 22 yards, with great blocking, to the goal line. Once more Simpson's attempted dropkick for the extra point was blocked, and it was 14-12, the final score.

Later in the third quarter the SONS advanced to the Rook eight-yard stripe after a sensational water-bucket forward pass from Simpson to Bob Napier. However, the drive petered out when Simpson's attempted field goal from a difficult angle was short and wide by inches.

Fighting a great battle, their best of the year, the SONS outplayed the Rooks in every department of the game but the score. Eberhart's team battered out 13 first downs to the Rook 7 and rolled up 167 yards from scrimmage to the Orange 114. SONS completed nine out of 23 attempted passes for 68 yards while the Rooks gained 31 yards from three completed passes out of eight attempts.

Olson's brilliant broken field touchdown run furnished the deciding factor in the hard-fought battle, and the inability of the SONS to convert after touchdowns.

HUSKIES DEFENSE HOLDS CALIFORNIA TO SCORELESS TIE

MEMORIAL STADIUM, Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 6.—(AP)—A University of Washington team found itself on this cleat-marked field this afternoon to battle University of California to a scoreless tie and remove the Golden Bears from the list of perfect record football eleven.

Balked by a foe which refused to fold up before the Golden Bears' widely vaunted steamroller attack, California wilted rapidly as the game wore on and in the end it was the Bears who were hanging on the ropes and Washington that was threatening to score.

With less than a minute to play, Washington was on California's 22 yard line, and Captain Fritz Waskowitz, the greatest individual player on the field today, set the ball in front of the goal posts for a placement goal attempt.

Pullback Al Cruver stepped back to make the try, while the crowd of 35,000 waited in a hushed, awed silence.

Cruver dropped his right foot hard against the ball, but the kick was low and it rolled to the ground to the left of the goal posts to save California from its first beating of the year.

There was time for one more play and California elected a desperate forward pass of the kind they had been trying all through the second half. It fell short, and Captain Waskowitz grabbed the ball, to carry home to Seattle, as the game ended.

At one time in the second period, the ball changed hands six times around mid-field.

Washington twice gave California scoring chances on fumbles inside the Husky 20 yard line, but the Bear backs, including four left halfbacks, Coach Stubb Allison sent in an effort to get his team rolling, failed to penetrate that stout defense the Seattle boys put up.

PURDUE BLASTED BY FORDHAM RUSH

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Rose Hill to Rose Bowl talk was loud and strong within the ranks of the Fordham Rams today.

On the Polo Grounds, greensward where their hopes were dashed almost a year ago, the Rams rose to their superb heights this afternoon to crush Purdue's Bollersmakers, 21 to 3, to rush along the highway of the nation's dwindling number of unbeaten football eleven.

Dropped behind by an attack of first period focus fog that gave the invaders from the banks of the Wabash a field goal for a 3-0 lead, the Rams struck back with perhaps their greatest and most versatile attack of the season to score two touchdowns in the second and another in the fourth periods, all of them by air.

STANFORD EDGES OUT TROJANS 7-6 IN COAST UPSET

MEMORIAL STADIUM, LOS ANGELES, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Stanford's Indiana tossed another bomb into the scrambled coast conference grid campaign today, edging out the favored Trojans of Southern California, 7 to 6.

Trailing 6 to 0 at the half and taking a beating under Troy's powerful running attack, Coach Tiny Thornhill's Redskins came back in the closing periods to yank the Trojan machine apart. Fifty-five thousand saw the game.

The winning margin came in the third quarter. Stanford took Troy's punt midfield, moving to the Trojan 41. Jim Groves, fullback, fired a pass to young Pete Fay, 170-pound halfback who squeezed through several Trojan tacklers and raced on across the goal.

The one-point margin of victory came from the toe of Bill Luckett, sub halfback.

Ambrose Schindler, Southern California's crack quarterback, engineered and made the Trojan touchdown in the second period. He drove the ball deep into Stanford territory, only to lose it when Fay, aided by Tony Calvelli, intercepted a pass on the 13-yard line.

Forced to kick, Stanford linemen led Howard Stocker, Trojan tackle, through and he blocked the punt.

The ball squirted out of bounds on the one-yard line. Schindler took one crack at right tackle and went over for the touchdown, but Ralph Stanley, sent in to kick, had the boot blocked.

ARMY WINS WHEN FUMBLE REGAINED

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Playing a non-offensive game before 3,500 fans, Oregon State college, after being held to a single touchdown scored in the first quarter, showed across two more in the final period to overwhelm Willamette university, Salem, 20-0, today.

The defeated Bearcats threatened only once in the third quarter when they grabbed a Beaver pass but the Saters halted the threat by tackling Weaver, Bearcat end, on the four-yard line after a 22-yard run. Weisberger, fullback, plunged to the State one-yard line on three tries and was stopped.

PITT OVERWHELMS NOTRE DAME 21-6 BY POWER SURGE

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Pittsburgh's Panthers touched off a last period blast of scoring dynamite that all but blew Notre Dame off the gridiron today before 55,000 spectators in the climax game of one of college football's most hard fought intersectional rivalries.

Trailing for the first time this season, by a six-point margin resulting from a spectacular Notre Dame scoring pass, the Rose Bowl champions came back with an overpowering surge to score three touchdowns and turn the match into a rout. The final score was 21 to 6 as Pittsburgh kept its place among the nation's unbeaten teams and flung another challenge to the far west for post season battle.

For two periods Notre Dame's aggressive, hard tackling forwards played their mighty rivals to a standstill. Midway in the third quarter the Irish pulled a dazzling 49-yard touchdown play on a forward pass, Jack McCarthy to Andy Pupile, to capitalize a sudden kicking "break." Then came the big explosion.

Marshall (Biggie) Goldberg, spearhead of Pittsburgh's attack, set up the first Pittsburgh touchdown with the collaboration of Fabian Hoffman, substitute end, on a forward pass that netted exactly 50 yards. Two subsequent drives of 66 and 48 yards, in which terrifying power was mixed with subtle deception, produced additional touchdowns.

Pullback Frank Patrick twice crossed the Irish goal line and Bill Stebbins once, while Frank Souchak, stellar Panther end, added the extra points with unerring place kicks.
