APPELATE, Nov. 6.—(Sp.)—Every member of the Applegate CCC camp who has not yet graduated from the eighth grade in school will be given an opportunity to obtain an eighth grade certificate through the cooperation of C. R. Bowman, Jackson county school superintendent.

ILLEGAL DUCK HUNTING BASIS OF HEAVY FINES
KIAMATH FALLS, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Stiff fines ranging from \$35 to \$92.50 and suspended jail sentences were the lot of duck hunters who brought illegal game from the Upper Klamath lake marshes on opening day last Monday.

The penalties were fixed by Judge Earl Bradfield of Chiloquin justice court. Most of the hunters claimed they were unaware they had killed illegal birds or that they brought them in rather than let them rot in the swamps, but their arguments failed to move the Chiloquin justice court.

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
