

### STORM OFF SEACOAST BRINGS VALLEY GALE

Wind sweeping through the valley this morning reached a peak velocity of 35 to 40 miles an hour, but the swirling gusts were of short duration, the weather bureau said. Average velocity ranged from 25 to 30 miles an hour.

No wind damage was immediately reported though it was believed some rural telephone lines were blown down.

The heavy blow came from a storm area centered off the coast northwest of here, the weather bureau stated. The wind was expected to subside as the storm area moved inland. Occasional rain was forecast.

This morning, while crowds lined the sea wall at the battery to obtain a glimpse of her, she was taken in a government ferry to Ellis Island.

Following the local board's decision to exclude her she announced that she would appeal to the board of review at Washington. The appeal will act as an automatic stay and she probably will remain on Ellis Island until Washington authorities act.

In 1926, U. S. authorities refused to permit Vera, former Countess of Catteras, to enter the United States on the same grounds.

Prior to coming to New York, she had been divorced in England on charges based on her friendship with the young Earl of Craven.

She finally obtained a writ of habeas corpus and was permitted to enter the country.
