Heaven's Highway Is Depicted

Speaking Sunday morning from the Nazareth pulpit, Fred M. Weatherford, pastor-evangelist, delivered an expository sermon from Isaiah the 35th chapter. His sermon in brief follows:

"This chapter," stated the pastor, "bears a two-fold message, namely the second coming of Christ, and the spiritual equipment of man, fitting him for that event. I shall deal with the latter phase."

"With the new-found gift of Christ you want to draw from every quarter to swell unto Him your songs of praise. Those who have not gone through the spiritual arduousness of the spiritual arduousness, and rightly so, for who, unaided by God, can rise above the realm of his own folly. However, it remains for those who have received the transforming grace of God to say whether it is mere human rapture, or a sacred unearthly spiritual felicity."

"God's way to Heaven is the way of holiness. The 8th verse of the chapter cited states, this highway 'shall be called the way of holiness.' If on this highway only the holy may travel, who but those who have holy feet can walk thereon. This way is distinguished from the way of the world by a wide demarcation in separation from, and non-conformity thereto."

"This highway must be a holy way because the Holy God constructed it to His place of dwelling, where only holy people are admitted."

"God created man a holy being and His purpose in recreating him is defeated unless he can recover to Him his possession of sinless purity. It would be a thrust at the rehabilitative power of God if He were unable to recast man from the spiritual crucible and remodel him like Himself."

"The word holiness is taken from the Hebrew word 'kadosh' which means to be ceremonially or morally. Sanctification is God's process of making a man holy. Holiness is the product of sanctification. The Greek word for sanctification is 'hagiasmos'. The Greek ending in 'mos' means an act, as does the English word ending in 'ion'. Hence sanctification is the divine act of God by which man is made holy."

"To make a distinction between justification and sanctification, permit me to set forth the following differentiation: Justification is a forensic term, meaning to absolve, clear of guilt, or declare one innocent. When God forgives one's transgressions he is justified; coincident God's Spirit of regenerating power takes place in the heart of man, removes the guilt of sin, and waives the death sentence, thus initiating salvation in the life of man."

"The prophet declares the unclean shall not travel this highway. They feel too much confidence in their own sound judgment and independence. To them life presents no problem for which they should inquire of the Lord. In all of the activities of the ungodly he has no goal, or beacon for elevation, with respect to eternity. He rushes up and down in the desert of trackless wastes, where he shall sooner or later be lost in the suffering wilderness."

"While asserting our belief in Christianity as a historical religion, most of the standards of society are only remotely allied with it, by leaving out all reality affecting criteria in Christian experience."
