Plan of Organization Explained at Enthusiastic Meeting — Membership Rolls to Close Saturday

The Southern Oregon Civic Music association membership enrollment week got off to a successful start Monday evening at the Medford hotel with more than 150 enthusiastic captains and team workers present for the kickoff banquet.

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"Everything went white," he said. "I went to the bedroom, got my pistol out of a dresser drawer, and shot him."

An aviator in the World war, Wright has been connected with transport flying in recent years. He was with Trans-America and Stout air lines in the pioneer days of commercial aviation, and came here in October, 1935 to become president of Union air terminal after serving as assistant to the president of United Air lines in Chicago.

Mrs. Wright was 33 years old and Kimmel is 35.

JAPAN MOBILIZES ON SOVIET BORDER AS BREAK LOOMS

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was hurrying to Khabarovsk, Siberia, to execute a "sweeping reformation" of the trans-Baikal forces.

Dispatches to the newspaper from Vladivostok said Voroshiloff's report to the Kremlin regarding the strength of the far eastern army was expected finally to determine the decision in Moscow.

The same source said the Soviet Union had extended the term of service for soldiers in Siberia and was rushing others into the area as "railway employees."

A dispatch to the newspaper from Asahi from Moscow said the Soviets were fanning anti-Japanism by slogans and resolutions.

Japan's military forces are a mixture of men from both the active and reserve lists. Military experts said "Japan is avoiding the German mistake in the World war of killing off the best troops first."

"Hence Japan is using men of 25 to 40 along with the first liners who are 20 and 23 years old," they said. "But Tokyo's forces along the Manchoukuo frontier were reported practically 100 percent from the active rolls. They had the best war equipment available."

Reliable Soviet sources expressed belief that one of the principal reasons why Japan had not declared war on China was a possibility that the Chinese-Russian non-aggression pact contains a secret rider providing for Soviet military assistance.

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Formal certification of the insanity proceedings against Earl H. Fehl, former county judge, filed last Saturday by Fred C. Kelly, from the county court to the circuit court, was made yesterday by County Judge Earl B. Day. The motion sets forth that Judge Day, by reason of proceedings filed by Fehl against him is disqualified to hear the case.

Similar action is expected to be taken by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton, and the state supreme court asked to assign a new judge for the case.

Filing of the insanity charge against Fehl will probably mean postponement of the civil action of H. Von Schmalz of Burns and George A. Rhoden of Salem, attorneys, suing Corintha E. Statley for \$3,322.33 for legal services rendered for Fehl. A motion filed by Fehl to disqualify Judge E. B. Ashurst of Klamath county, assigned to hear the case, is also pending.

County authorities said today steps were underway to speed the insanity hearing.

Fehl is confined in a separate ward in the county jail and does not mingle with the other prisoners, Sheriff Syd L. Brown said.

CHINESE FORCES LEAVE SHANGHAI IN HANDS OF FOE

loss: Chinese, \$200,000,000; casualties (dead and wounded): Japanese, 125,000; Chinese, 300,000; trade loss: Japanese, \$250,000,000; Chinese, \$100,000,000.

During the day, about 80,000 Chinese refugees entered the French concession and the International settlement. Many of them stormed barred wire barricades and barred gates while police struggled to handle distracted Chinese throngs.

Chinese Seek Safety. After the Chinese army retreated from its western sector and the Japanese forces started taking over the territory, tens of thousands of Chinese refugees were sandwiched between the two forces. They rushed to the borders of the International area, begging admittance.

Although Mayor G. K. Yui was virtually without a city to govern, he said his office would function as usual from the French concession, and added that he had no thought of running away.

His jurisdiction extended only over a small area of the Nantao quarter. American and foreign military observers said the principal lesson of the Shanghai war was that poorly equipped but numerically superior forces had little chance against a smaller, well-mechanized and well-organized army.

As in the Italian conquest of Ethiopia, the airplane played a decisive part in Shanghai operations. Japanese also used numbers of tanks, armored cars, heavy guns and warships.

Flesh Against Steel. "It was largely a case of flesh against steel," said one American officer. "It was a miracle how China's nondescript army held out so long against the highly mechanized forces of Japan."

Approximately 6,000 Chinese soldiers, cut off on all sides by advancing Japanese, took up positions in the Nantao area adjoining the French concession. Barricading themselves, 600 of the isolated troops declared they would hold out to the death against invading Japanese.

They converted rows of Chinese shacks facing the boundary of the French concession into veritable fortresses and said only bombs or fire would force them out. If the detachment were attacked from the west or south, Japanese would be forced to fire into the French concession.

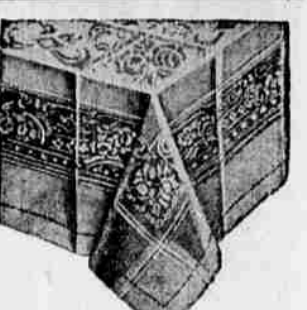
