A statistical report as of May 31, 1937, shows the total airport program approved by the president and eligible for operation. Oregon had 41 approved projects involving 35 airport sites and a total estimated cost of \$2,741,248.

Asks Flag Salute—Jackson county chapter of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War today issued an appeal that the proper respect be shown the American flag in tomorrow's Armistice Day parade.
