

ALIEN WINES PUT ON NEW BLACKLIST BY ITALIAN BOSS

King Sets Example As Mussolini Extends Campaign for Self-Sufficiency — Il Duce Turns to Rice

ROME (UP)—King Victor Emmanuel, in keeping with Italy's self-sufficiency campaign, has ordered that no more foreign wines or beverages are to appear on the royal tables.

Amedeo Pettini, chief chef to the king, announced that henceforth only Italian wines and liquors will be served at the Quirinal, a story appearing in the Turin newspaper, Gazzetta del Popolo, said.

Every bottle of foreign wine consumed in Italy means a reduction of Italy's gold balance. The king therefore decided to subscribe to the "Buy Italian" movement.

His chief gives a list of the various wines which were served at his majesty's table and their Italian substitutes.

Complete List Substituted

With the hors d'oeuvres Capri, Salerno and Cortese are served instead of Bordeaux, Burgundy and Chablis. Zucco, Vernaccia and San Michele are served with soups and spaghetti instead of Madera and Sherry. Lacrima Christi, Soave, Frascati and Trebbiano have taken the place of Moselle, Rhine wines and Graves which were served with fish.

The first meat course once was accompanied by light Bordeaux and Burgundies, which have now been substituted by Lambrusco, Dolcetto and Fiesc. With the main meat course and cheese red Barolo, Barbera and Barbaresco are served in place of old heavy red Burgundies and Bordeaux. With sweets, Italian champagnes such as Gancia, Boeca, Cinzano and Asti have taken the place of Mumm, Moet et Chandon, Pommery and Veuve Cluquet. Hennessy, Martell, Courvoisier and other brandies have been replaced by Italian Sarti, Luxardo and Baker brandies.

Premier Benito Mussolini, like the king, follows the "Use Italian" campaign. He has learned that to practice what he preaches is the best way to convince Italians to follow his commands.

Mussolini Eats Rice

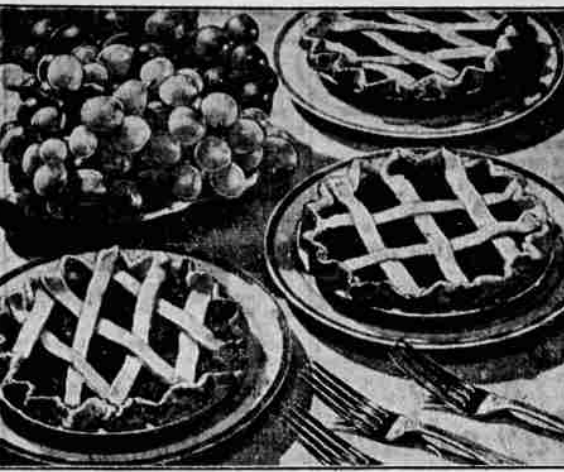
During the famous "Eat More Rice" campaign, Fascist-controlled newspapers published long articles relating how numerous sacks of rice had been shipped to the dictator's villa in Rome by a rice producer of Novara.

When it was feared that an oil embargo would be clamped on Italy during the Ethiopian campaign and every drop of gasoline was needed to keep the mechanized army's tanks from drying up under the scorching African sun, Italians were asked to drive as little as possible. Week-end driving to the country was forbidden. Mussolini no longer was seen driving his red Alfa-Romeo speed roadster to Porti for short periods of rest. Il Duce traveled by railroad. He also had the motor of his official car transformed to run by synthetic alcohol.

Since sanctions were enforced upon Italy, Mussolini has been doing his utmost to speed up national production and reduce foreign imports to the minimum. Every available bit of soil is being tilled and the peninsula's subsoil searched for raw materials and minerals.

Hundreds of miles of railroads are being electrified to free the country from costly coal importation.

These Luscious Mince Pies Are Sure to Honey Male Tongues



If you yearn for compliments from a beau, a husband or merely in-laws, this recipe for mince pie will work like a charm. It's quickly made, economical, and always delicious. Just break 1 9-ounce package dry mince meat into pieces. Add 1 1/2 cups water and 3 tablespoons sugar. Place over heat and stir until all lumps are thoroughly broken up. Bring to brisk boil; continue boiling for one minute. Allow to cool. Line a 9-inch pie plate or individual pie plates with pastry and fill with mince meat. Place lattice of pastry strips across top. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) 35 minutes.

STUDY OF NUDE CO-ED PICTURES 'HEADACHE JOB'

Head Of Wayne University Health Service Tells Of Procedure—Parents Of Girls Make Protest.

DETROIT (UP)—Looking at photographs of hundreds of nude Wayne university co-eds is "a headache of a job" to Dr. Irvin W. Sander, chief of the school's health service.

This was his observation after a minor furor arose when two parents and a couple of freshmen girls objected to the taking of nude pictures by which the health service spots defects in posture.

Dr. Sander vigorously defended the system and pointed out that it is being used by several first-rank schools including Stanford and the Universities of Iowa and Michigan.

Carefully Guarded

"Mrs. Rea Peterson, a registered nurse, and I are the only ones who ever see the pictures," Dr. Sander explained. "We took about 900 last month and we worked all day Sunday developing and printing and we aren't half done. It's a headache of a job."

Girls to be photographed in the nude are taken one at a time into an upstairs room of the university clinic building, Dr. Sander said. A registered nurse instructs them and they are handed a hospital nightgown.

"Then," Dr. Sander explained, "they are ready for the picture. The small room is curtained off from the side and in front of the camera, so that actually the photographer sees the student only through the lens."

Subject Wears Mask

"The girl enters the room down a curtained aisle at the end of which she is met by another registered nurse, who shows her where to stand on a step a few inches from the floor. Then the girl, wearing a mask, hands the robe to the nurse."

"The camera is already in focus and one picture is taken from front and another from the side. It takes about a minute. As soon as the second click is heard the nurse hands the robe to the girl and it is over."

"The parents and girls who objected, their names were not divulged, were curious about who takes the pictures and what is done with them. Dr. Sander reassured them."

Nurse Operates Camera

"During the picture-taking," he said, "no one is allowed on the second floor except registered nurses, myself and the student. Mrs. Peterson takes all the pictures, with the exception of one in every 18 which I take after reloading the camera just to see that it is working correctly."

Girls who object to the picture-taking phase of their health examination are excused. Dr. Sander pointed out and only two so far have objected.

Bathing suits could be used, he said, "but we found that in some cases the bathing suit covered hip defects."

The system has the full approval of Dr. Charles L. Spain, executive vice president of the university. "I have never seen one of the pictures," he declared, "but I have seen the set-up and can't see anything about it to criticize."

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Oregon Peach Pie Supreme

1 cup Borden's Evaporated Milk
1 cup water
1 cup granulated sugar
1/4 cup flour
1/4 teaspoon salt

2 egg yolks
1 tablespoon butter
1/2 teaspoon lemon extract
1/2 cup fresh or canned peaches
Baked Pie Shell or Crumb Crust (10 inch)

Blend Borden's Evaporated Milk and water. Mix 1/2 cup sugar, flour and salt. Add 1 cup cold milk mixture gradually, stirring until smooth. Scald remaining milk. Add flour mixture. Stir constantly over boiling water until mixture thickens. Cover and cook 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Pour over well-beaten egg yolks. Return to double boiler and cook until egg is set (about 2 minutes). Add butter. Cool. Add lemon extract. Slice part of peaches into pie shell and pour cooled filling over them. Garnish with whipped cream and remainder of sliced peaches.

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
