BAKER QUIET AFTER ANTI-UNION DISPLAY

BAKER, Ore., Nov. 12.—(AP)—Baker settled down to its usual quiet routine today following a Wednesday night labor demonstration, in which Dave Rutz, teamsters' union representative, was escorted from the city and Louis L. Richards and Tom Estabrook, two other American Federation of Labor organizers, were forced to leave town.

One hundred grocery clerks, service station men, mill workers, teamsters and others marched to the hotel where the three men were stopping and took control of Rutz, Estabrook and Richards escaped from the building with the assistance of waiters union members after Richards is alleged by officers to have brandished a gun at the demonstrators.

TAX FORECLOSURE WILL BE IN ORDER AFTER JANUARY 1

There will be county tax foreclosure proceedings after January 1 next on all property on which no payment of taxes has been made, and showing a delinquency of more than three years, Sheriff Syd L. Brown said today.

The 1936 legislature passed a law deferring foreclosure until after 1938 and placed the delinquency period at five years, the sheriff explained. This law was amended by the last legislature, putting the delinquency period back to three years.

If the taxpayers will make arrangements to pay their current taxes and one-half of the oldest year delinquency they can be carried on a payment plan basis, regardless of how many years delinquent, the sheriff explains.

Any taxpayer who has paid his 1936 tax in full and one-fourth of his oldest delinquency during 1936, can now protect his property by paying the 1937 current tax in full and the second one-fourth of his oldest delinquency. If no taxes were paid in 1936, the taxpayer can still protect his property by paying the 1937 current tax in full with half of the oldest delinquency tax, with interest on the one-fourth not paid last year, under the law, the sheriff said.

The last day under the above payment plans will be December 31.

Taxpayers desiring to know the exact amount necessary to be paid to protect their property from foreclosure can obtain this information by inquiring at the tax collection department of the sheriff's office.
