

INDICT MONMOUTH PLAYERS; ASHLAND DRUG CLERK FREE

No True Bill Against Messenger By Grand Jury—Others Held On Rice Robbery Charge.

The Jackson county grand jury Saturday morning returned a true bill charging George Marshall Hearn, 20, Eli Lee Cagle, 23, and Stanley Hugh Borden, 19, Oregon Normal school at Monmouth football squad members, with robbery by force and violence, without the use of a dangerous weapon. A not true bill was returned against Richard M. Messenger, 22, Ashland drug clerk.

Bonds for Hearn, Cagle, and Borden were fixed at \$1000 each. Circuit Judge H. D. Norton said: "In fixing the bonds at this low amount, I am governed by the large number of letters that have been received from responsible parties throughout the state, informing the court of the former good standing and character of these youths."

Hearn and Cagle hail from North Carolina and Borden from Olympia, Wash. The district attorney informed the bench the trio had told him they doubt their ability to furnish bond in any amount.

Messenger, a former Oregon State college honor student and a member of a widely known Josephine county family, has been at liberty on \$2000 bonds.

The indictment specifically charges the trio with the alleged theft by force of \$313.50 and a gold watch from the person of E. D. Rice, Dallas, Texas, jewelry salesman, on the new Pacific highway near Ashland on the night of October 30 while en route in an auto owned and driven by Messenger, to haul in Rice's auto stalled in the Siskiyou by mechanical trouble.

Rice, the complaining witness, alleged when the Messenger auto stopped he was assaulted and robbed and left beaten on the highway, when his asserted assailants returned to Ashland and divided the loot at Messenger's home.

Messenger was arrested by Ashland city police a few hours later and the three athletes at Monmouth the following day by state police. All made signed statements admitting participation, the district attorney claims.

Attorney James T. Chinnock of Grants Pass, former state senator, counsel for Messenger, will also represent the three defendants it was said. Trial within the next two weeks is predicted.

GOPHER CONTROL BATTLE STARTED

Four pocket gopher control demonstrations will be held in the county on Monday and Tuesday. Arrangements have been made by County Agent R. G. Fowler with Arthur Crews of the U. S. biological survey to conduct the demonstrations. All farmers are invited.

Pocket gophers do an immense amount of damage annually and while many farmers make an attempt to control them, they are a menace to crops in the county, Mr. Fowler said.

SIG ASH BID LOW ON G. PASS SCHOOL

Sig Ash, former Medford contractor, now of Portland, submitted low bid of \$70,888 for construction of a new grade school in Grants Pass. It was disclosed with opening of bids in the Climate city Friday evening.

Six bids were entered on the building, which is to replace the Riverside school, destroyed by fire last January. The new building, according to William Laing, Medford architect who drew the plans, will be modern in all respects with sprinkler system, automatic light control and forced circulation hot water heating system.

Construction, which will start as soon as drawings and papers are approved by the PWA, is to be completed within six months, Mr. Laing said Saturday.

TRIP DOWN ROGUE GIVEN WRITE-UP IN FRISCO PAPER

As a result of a boat trip down the Rogue river from a point 20 miles below Grants Pass to Gold Beach, taken by Frederick Wagner, publisher of the San Francisco Call-Bulletin, and his nephew, G. R. Clancy of Los Angeles, a three-column story appeared in a recent issue of the Call-Bulletin describing the beauty and bounteous fish and game abounding in that section.

It was written by "Uncle Joe" Dearing, who conducts a daily column in the San Francisco newspaper. Dearing lets Publisher Wagner tell the story of the 100-mile trip in his own words, part of which follows:

"Of the total distance to Gold Beach, between 75 and 80 miles is shooting fast, thrilling rapids and riffles. Our boat was run backward down the river for about 80 miles through swift water. Our guide, Glen Woolridge of Grants Pass, faced downstream to be in position to spot rocks and to guide our craft into the current.

"At two points on the trip we completely unloaded. At one place, Blossom Bar, a virtual Niagara, the boat was lifted across huge boulders and then put into the swift stream and cautiously lowered several hundred yards by means of ropes. Inter-spersing the seemingly endless number of rapids were smooth deep pools of water slowly moving between precipitous canyon walls of unsurpassed magnificence. Each of these quiet and beautiful gorges, however, proved to be the quiet before the storm.

"They preceded descents into swirling, roaring, foaming cascades, the meanest of which was the Devil's Staircase, which is modestly named, indeed.

"It took nine days to make the voyage down the Rogue although without any overday stops it can be made in five days of steady travel. We stayed over full days at four points that were so beautiful and the fishing so good we couldn't go on sooner. When we reached clear water, we easily caught all the fish we could consume. The steelhead we took measured 12 to 20 inches; the trout around 10 inches, with many larger.

"On the fourth day out a forked horn buck, dressing around 135 pounds, was bagged. This fine animal was found browsing around an abandoned orchard, not far from the river. Deer signs were everywhere, and many friendly and curious fawns and does were onlookers wherever we made our camp. On the seventh day, we shot a bear.

"Although we spent the tenth day trolling for salmon at the mouth of the Rogue river without getting a strike, the trip was voted a perfect cruise. Marvellous fishing, a bear, a deer, thrilling shooting of rapids, and periods of drifting through timber lined country of indescribable grandeur. What more could any sportsman—of either rod or gun clan—ask?

"Although the Rogue river trip is an ever changing paradise for sportsmen, it is of equal attraction to lovers of the great outdoors. For rugged, verdant and varied scenery, it is unequalled. Very few, however, have ridden the rapids of the Rogue because of its being so little known.

"As an indication of how comparatively few people have about the rapids of the Rogue, it is recounted that in 22 years, Woolridge has piloted about 225 passengers in 75 trips.

"With broader exploitation of the Rogue river territory, that region is destined to immensely greater popularity. Intelligent publicity by the Oregon state highway commission and the typical western cordiality and hospitality of citizens of various communities of Oregon are hastening the day of enjoyment of that unsurpassed virgin territory by more lovers of the outdoors."
