## United Lutherans Plan Membership And Fund Appeal

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. (SpI)—The Board of American Missions of the United Lutheran church in America announced today through its office here that the Rev. F. S. Belstel of Eugene, Ore., will have charge of the church's anniversary appeal in that area.  
The Rev. L. H. Steinhoff of Denver, Colo., will assist him as a special representative of the mission board.

Through the anniversary appeal, the Lutherans plan to increase their membership with a concentrated program of personal evangelism. A determined effort will be made to reach the millions of unchurched in the nation and through gifts from the members secure funds to broaden the scope of the church extension work.  
The appeal, according to the Rev. Zenan M. Corbe, D. D., executive secretary of the mission board, was determined upon at the last national convention of the U.L.C.A. as the most appropriate way to celebrate the twentieth anniversary of the organization of the church the merger of three general Lutheran bodies.

## YUKON FUR OUTPUT IS CUT BY FLOODS

SEWARD, Alaska (UP)—Upland game and fur-bearing animals inhabiting the Yukon river country suffered setbacks by recent floods that will require years to adjust, Frank Dufrene, executive officer of the Alaska game commission and regional director of the Biological survey, said.

The animals were driven back 50 miles, Dufrene estimated, and he said it was impossible to estimate losses suffered.  
Full damage done at the time of the floods is now being made known. He said it would be felt in the season's trapping. The Alaska game commission head returned from the districts affected with information that attitude of the game had undergone radical change in the past 10 years.  
People are becoming more and more interested in the conservation movement, Dufrene said.

A new British chemical process for rendering wool non-stinkable has attracted considerable attention. Chemicals utilized by the process are said to cost 15 cents per hundred pounds of dry wool, and little special equipment is required.
