JACKSONVILLE CHURCH HAS RIVAL FOR HONOR OF FIRST IN FAR WEST

Jacksonville's historic Methodist church building, said to be the oldest Protestant church west of the Rocky mountains, has a rival.

According to C. C. Hammerly, route 2, Portland, the West Union Baptist church near Hillsboro was completed and dedicated in 1833. Mr. Ham-

merly's statement appears in last week's issue of the Oregon Farmer, which publication carried recently a photo of the old church and brief account of the commemorative rally held in October. Mr. Hammerly's article says in part:

"There may have been other early buildings, but the oldest church building, not Catholic anyway, that has never been used for any other purpose, so far as the writer has been able to learn, is this church six miles north of Hillsboro and two miles west of the St. John suspension bridge, Portland.

"The Methodist had some missions in the district before West Union organization, May 25, 1844, but the permanent edifice, solidly built of cedar in 1853 at this place near Oregon's metropolis, with no trace of decay, holds the record as the oldest."

The Jacksonville church was built in 1854 and dedicated on the first Sunday in January, 1855, according to the bronze plaque placed on the front of the building by the Daughters of American Revolution.
